We are asking you to participate because your performance, stories, skills or knowledge and work is a valuable and important part of our shared cultural heritage in the Upper Midwest.

Participation would involve first documenting your performance, stories, skills, and local knowledge through audio recording, photographs, and/or video recording. Then, you would be invited to participate in an approximately 30-50 minute interview about your performance, stories, skills, and local knowledge. Finally, the records and photographs of your performance, stories, skills, and local knowledge and your interview will be saved in the Upper Midwestern Digital Folklore Archives at the University of Wisconsin and made available on the Internet so our cultural heritage is preserved and made available to anyone in the world.

Your participation in this study is voluntary; you may choose not to participate. There is no cost incurred with participation.

PURPOSE OF THIS STUDY:

The purpose of this study is to locate, document, preserve and make accessible the cultural heritage of the Upper Midwest region.

BENEFITS OF THE STUDY:

Third, you agree to have the audio, photo and video recordings of your *performance*, *stories*, *skills*, *and local knowledge* and your interview archived in the Upper Midwestern Digital Folklore Archives at the University of Wisconsin-Madison's Center for the Study of Upper Midwestern Cultures (http://csumc.wisc.edu) and made accessible to anyone through the Internet.

RISKS OF THIS STUDY:

This research is not confidential. Participation in the study may involve minor social risks, and the researchers have taken precautions to minimize these risks. The researcher will record the interview, and these recordings and/or quotations from these recordings may be used in scholarly publications or classroom materials. They will be archived indefinitely in the Upper Midwestern Digital Folklore Archives and made accessible on the Internet. Private individuals or institutions could gain access to your participation and responses. Because your these archives will be publicly accessible through the Internet, it is possible that someone familiar with you could recognize that you have participated in this research.
