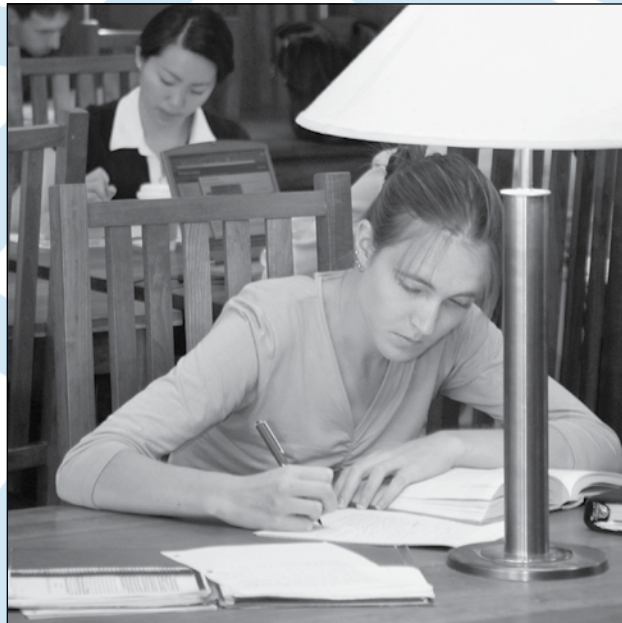

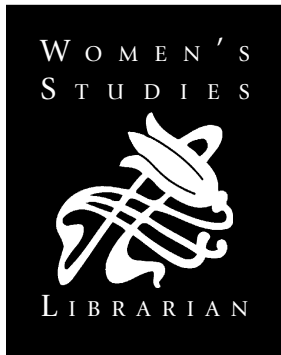

# Feminist Periodicals

A current listing of contents

Volume 28, Number 1 (Winter 2008)

Periodical literature is the cutting edge of women's scholarship, feminist theory, and much of women's culture. *Feminist Periodicals: A Current Listing of Contents* is published by the Office of the University of Wisconsin System Women's Studies Librarian on a quarterly basis with the intent of increasing public awareness of feminist periodicals. It is our hope that *Feminist Periodicals* will serve several purposes: to keep the reader abreast of current topics in feminist literature; to increase readers' familiarity with a wide spectrum of feminist periodicals; and to provide the requisite bibliographic information should a reader wish to subscribe to a journal or to obtain a particular article at her library or through interlibrary loan. (Users will need to be aware of the limitations of the new copyright law with regard to photocopying of copyrighted materials.)

Table of contents pages from current issues of major feminist journals are reproduced in each issue of *Feminist Periodicals*, preceded by a comprehensive annotated listing of all journals we have selected. As publication schedules vary enormously, not every periodical will have table of contents pages reproduced in each issue of *FP*. The annotated listing provides the following information on each journal:

1. Year of first publication.
2. Frequency of publication.
3. Subscription prices (print only; for online prices, consult publisher).
4. Subscription address.
5. Current editor.
6. Editorial address (if different from subscription address).
7. International Standard Serials Number (ISSN).
8. OCLC, Inc. Control Number.
9. Selected publications in which the journal is indexed.
10. Selected fulltext products in which publication appears or vendor intermediaries who make the full text available.
11. Subject focus/statement of purpose of the journal.

Please note that in the actual text, only the numbers 1 to 11 are used to identify the different categories of information.

Our goal in *FP* is to represent English-language periodicals from around the world that focus on women's studies or women's issues. Generally, we do not include mainstream newsstand magazines. We are also unable to include periodicals that lack a complete table of contents. We encourage feminist serials to build a full table of contents into their regular format to facilitate possible inclusion in *FP* and indexing elsewhere.

Interested readers will find more complete information on feminist periodicals in *DWM: A Directory of Women's Media*, published by the National Council for Research on Women (530 Broadway at Spring Street, New York, NY 10012); and in *Women's Periodicals and Newspapers: A Union List of the Holdings of Madison Area Libraries*, edited by James P. Danky and compiled by Maureen E. Hady, Barry Christopher, and Neill E. Strache (Boston: G.K. Hall, 1982).



Suggestions for improvements of *Feminist Periodicals* are gratefully received. We would particularly appreciate assistance from readers in the UW System with our efforts to keep the holding information complete and up to date. Please let us know about new subscriptions, subscriptions we have overlooked, cancellations, or other pertinent information. *Feminist Periodicals* is also available on microfilm at the library of the State Historical Society of Wisconsin.

*Sexual trauma has a devastating wake that impacts survivors and their intimate relationships. Current couple therapy models address the effects of sexual trauma on individuals and relationships. Many of these models acknowledge the importance of addressing gender inequalities. So far, no model of couple therapy makes patriarchy central to the conceptualization of sexual trauma and treatment. This paper asserts that sexual trauma is one of the most horrific manifestations of patriarchy and therefore is most effectively treated when an understanding of patriarchy is made central to conceptualization and treatment. We propose that inviting couples into conversations about ways in which patriarchy organizes their relationship is liberating for both partners and creates space for more preferred ways of being intimate.*

- Republican Motherhood Redux?: Women as Contingent  
Citizens in 21st Century America

*This article examines the re-emergence of republican motherhood, once used to define the unique and conditional relationship between women and the state in the nineteenth century. By examining recent developments in federal and state abortion policy, I reveal the current trend toward "devolving" women's social and political citizenship rights to the states, where they will once again be highly variable and often contingent upon women's mothering status. Alternatively, these same policy developments demonstrate the simultaneous nationalization of fetal rights and a language of fetal citizenship or patriotic natalism. While women's citizenship becomes contingent upon the caprices of local power structures, fetal citizenship emerges as a uniform, national concept.*

- Masculinity as Political Strategy: George W. Bush,  
the "War on Terrorism," and an Echoing Press

*Scholars have demonstrated the centrality of masculinity as an ideology in the American presidency, but have devoted insufficient attention to the manner in which political leaders can emphasize masculine themes to gain strategic advantage, and how media organizations can be encouraged to adopt such themes in news coverage. With this in mind, in this research we analyze (1) President George W. Bush's public communications prior to and immediately following the attacks of September 11, 2001, and (2) NBC network television news coverage and New York Times and Washington Post editorials during the latter dates to elucidate the nature of masculinity as a political strategy. Findings indicate that in the aftermath of September 11 Bush enacted a highly masculine ideology through his treatment of the press and emphasis upon two masculine themes—strength and dominance—and that this approach facilitated wide circulation of his masculine discourse in the press.*

- Male and Female Sources in Newspaper Coverage  
of Male and Female Candidates  
in US Senate Races in 2004

*This study assesses how the largest daily newspapers in states with female US Senate candidates in 2004 used non-partisan male and female expert and non-expert sources in covering campaigns. Using content analysis, it found that male, non-partisan sources appeared more frequently and prominently than did female sources. That difference was more than four times greater for expert sources who provided "horse race" or "issue" commentary than for non-expert sources. It also found that reporters of both genders cited female sources equally rarely. There was a negative correlation between gender diversity in story sourcing and newsroom racial diversity. The relative scarcity of female sources may have a significant effect on potential readership and the campaign-related news they receive.*

- The Paradox of Protestantism and Women in Elected  
Office in the United States

*In cross-national studies, scholars have found that wealthy countries and those with a Protestant tradition are more likely to have higher levels of women in elected office. Even though the United States should then be high in this domain, it lags behind many similarly situated countries. We posit that one reason for this paradox is that Protestantism in the United States is far more socially conservative than is typical in other Protestant countries. To test our argument, we use state-level data on the proportion of women in elected office from 2002 to 2004 and survey data on church membership. We find a negative relationship between the percentage of Protestants belonging to churches associated with the National Association of Evangelicals, a lobbying group representing socially conservative Protestant denominations, and the proportion of women in elected office.*

*Between 1944 and 1972, African American women from New York City ran for all levels of elected office, from City Council to the United States Presidency. In this article, I argue that World War II created unprecedented opportunities for women to enter politics. A study of postwar New York offers an excellent opportunity to examine how black women defied conventions of gender and race, challenging the pervasive image of the urban political operative, to advance in the city's tough electoral arena. They succeeded in overcoming the Democratic Party machine, Tammany Hall's, resistance to running black women. Once inside the system, despite significant obstacles, these women pushed to change the Democratic Party in important ways for women and for African Americans.*

*The victim impact statement (VIS) is a written account of the physical, psychological, and economic harms experienced by a victim as a result of crime. *Summit House is a residential alternative-to-incarceration program in North Carolina that operates in a home-like setting for female offenders and their children; the Program is designated an intermediate sanction. The Program has been recognized by experts in the field as a national model. Despite national recognition and honor, however, little is known about the process by which the Program assists women in their role as mothers. 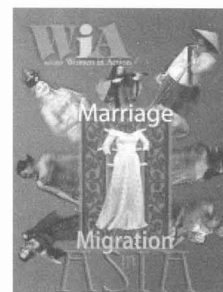
