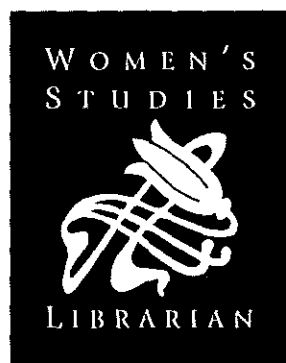

Periodical literature is the cutting edge of women's scholarship, feminist theory, and much of women's culture. *Feminist Periodicals: A Current Listing of Contents* is published by the Office of the University of Wisconsin System Women's Studies Librarian on a quarterly basis with the intent of increasing public awareness of feminist periodicals. It is our hope that *Feminist Periodicals* will serve several purposes: to keep the reader abreast of current topics in feminist literature; to increase readers' familiarity with a wide spectrum of feminist periodicals; and to provide the requisite bibliographic information should a reader wish to subscribe to a journal or to obtain a particular article at her library or through interlibrary loan. (Users will need to be aware of the limitations of the new copyright law with regard to photocopying of copyrighted materials.)

Table of contents pages from current issues of major feminist journals are reproduced in each issue of *Feminist Periodicals*, preceded by a comprehensive annotated listing of all journals we have selected. As publication schedules vary enormously, not every periodical will have table of contents pages reproduced in each issue of *FP*. The annotated listing provides the following information on each journal:

1. Year of first publication.
2. Frequency of publication.
3. U.S. subscription price(s).
4. Subscription address.
5. Current editor.
6. Editorial address (if different from subscription address).
7. International Standard Serials Number (ISSN).
8. OCLC, Inc. Control Number.
9. Selected publications in which the journal is indexed.
10. Selected fulltext products in which publication appears or vendor intermediaries who make the full text available.
11. Subject focus/statement of purpose of the journal.

Please note that in the actual text, only the numbers 1 to 11 are used to identify the different categories of information.

Our goal in *FP* is to represent English-language periodicals from around the world that focus on women's studies or women's issues. Generally, we do not include mainstream newsstand magazines. We are also unable to include periodicals that lack a complete table of contents. We encourage feminist serials to build a full table of contents into their regular format to facilitate possible inclusion in *FP* and indexing elsewhere.

Interested readers will find more complete information on feminist periodicals in *DWM: A Directory of Women's Media* published by the National Council for Research on Women (530 Broadway at Spring Street, New York, NY 10012); and in *Women's Periodicals and Newspapers: A Union List of the Holdings of Madison Area Libraries*, edited by James P. Danky, compiled by Maureen E. Hady, Barry Christopher, and Neill E. Strache (Boston: G.K. Hall, 1982).

Suggestions for improvements of *Feminist Periodicals* are gratefully received. We would particularly appreciate assistance from readers in the UW System with our efforts to keep the holding information complete and up to date. Please let us know about new subscriptions, subscriptions we have overlooked, cancellations, or other pertinent information. *Feminist Periodicals* is also available on microfilm at the library of the State Historical Society of Wisconsin.

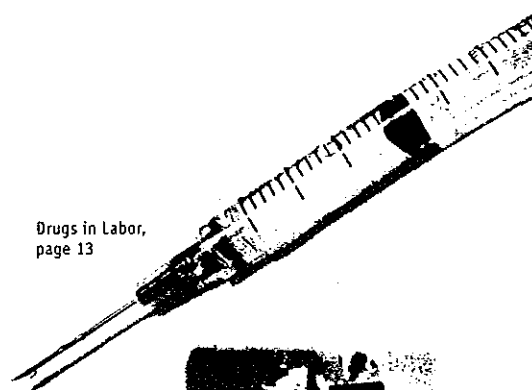

Gender and Theology in Marguerite de Navarre's *Heptaméron*:
A Reading of Novella 65

Nancy E. Virtue.....11

This article examines the question of masculinity in the *Heptaméron* in the context of Marguerite de Navarre's evangelical faith. In particular, it analyzes Novella 65, which is recounted by Géburon, the oldest male storyteller or *devisant* in the *Heptaméron*. Géburon's age and declining physical condition have to some extent forced him off both the military and sexual battlefield. But this tired soldier is not merely interested in telling war stories. No longer able to perform his masculinity as in the past, Géburon turns to a new, more satisfying performance through the narrative act—that of keeping and protecting God's word. Novella 65 thus demonstrates efficiently how Marguerite de Navarre's narrative innovations are intricately connected to her religious beliefs.

Telling Apart the Works of Male and Female Playwrights: Two 17th-Century Contrasts

Perry Gethner.....21

Although neither male authors nor female authors should be treated as monolithic groups, it is sometimes possible to discern gender-related views and preoccupations by examining side by side pairs of works treating the same subject. In Gabriel Gilbert's treatment of the classical myth of Endymion and Diana the goddess is presented as a powerless victim of ruthless male deities. Only by going into voluntary exile into the underworld can she find autonomy and love. Françoise Pascal, dramatizing the same myth, makes Diana the supreme deity, who picks her own consort and, with the aid of a powerful female magician, imposes physical and psychological trials on him to guarantee his fidelity and submissiveness. Georges de Scudéry, in dramatizing the persecution of a Roman empress and his daughter by a tyrannical Vandal king, celebrates the male chivalric ideal: valiant and courteous knights prevail and save damsels in distress, and even the villain is converted to magnanimity. Antoinette Deshoulières, in her adaptation of the same story, presents a pessimistic world in which the most energetic characters are impervious to virtue and love, while even the noble-hearted characters are weak and unsure of their beliefs.

Sexual Education as Enlightenment in Riccoboni's *Lettres de Mistriss Fanni Butlerd à Mylord Charles Alfred* and *Histoire du Marquis de Cressy*

Heidi Bostic.....32

This article examines Marie Jeanne Riccoboni's first two novels as testimonials in favor of an expanded understanding of Enlightenment that is broad enough to address women's experiences and contributions within both the social world and the intellectual project of eighteenth-century France. The trope of sexual education as Enlightenment serves as a lens through which to read the novels. On the surface, these two works would seem to be simply commentaries on failed love affairs and condemnations of male deception. On a deeper level, however, they offer insight into the gender coding of the Enlightenment. The novels show that, for women, there are two possible contradictory outcomes of sexual education as Enlightenment: maturity or death. The novels serve to educate readers about both possibilities.

Ourika in Black and White: Textual and Visual Interplay

Thérèse De Raedt.....45

Although a bestseller after its publication in 1823, Mme de Duras's novel, *Ourika*, was subsequently forgotten by French literary canons. It recently enjoyed a new popularity and is increasingly studied. In this article, the interplay of Mme de Duras' text and various artistic representations is analyzed with an emphasis on its protagonist's racial coding. First, the nineteenth-century corpus of images depicting the eponymous character Ourika is examined. Through a descriptive and thematic analysis informed by theory on the process of illustration as translation, I study how characters and plot are rendered as visual images. Then, more recent images of Ourika as they appear on book covers are read as propagating ideas and values of the late twentieth century, which also contributed to the revival of Mme de Duras's text. I show how the politics of representation and publication issues intersect and how, despite changes in the socio-political and cultural contexts of the last two centuries, the representation of Ourika as captive remains in the text/image relationship.

Body, Text, and Language: Wittig's Struggle for the Universal in *Les Guérillères*

Cybelle McFadden Wilkens.....70

In her second book, *Les Guérillères*, published in 1969, Monique Wittig sought to challenge and revolutionize the representation of women's experience. This text has often been read as a militant feminist text, but I would like to suggest a new reading of it: Wittig's *Les Guérillères*, read in light of the French commitment to the universal, posits the possibility for women to represent all of humanity, that is, the general or the whole. The allegory of the Amazonian women fighting for freedom is a powerful one indeed, for it captures the need for women to reclaim their silenced voices, but more importantly to show a historical process whereby women become representative of humanity, neither more nor less human than men. Reading Wittig's *Les Guérillères* from a Beauvoiran perspective allows for the realization of the category of women to represent all human beings. How can women represent the universal, be representative of humanity, without denying their situation or claiming some sort of neutrality? Wittig engages this task thematically and linguistically in *Les Guérillères*. I will argue that the women in the text do not seek a gender-neutral corrective to the destructive masculine order, but that they strive to represent the general, the whole, as embodied women.

Écrire et lire l'inceste : Christine Angot

Isabelle Cata et Eliane DalMolin.....85

Cet article propose une étude de ce qu'inceste veut dire chez Christine Angot, écrivaine qui depuis 1990 occupe solidement la scène littéraire avec une production remarquable de nombreux romans ou récits dont le point de convergence et la matière récurrente semblent être l'inceste et son traitement littéraire. Nous analysons comment le concept de l'inceste a guidé et transformé l'écriture d'Angot et pour ce faire nous privilégions une définition psychanalytique de l'inceste où le réel se distingue du fantasme (et vice-versa) tout en l'influençant. Dans une première partie, intitulée « Écrire l'inceste », nous examinons comment Angot interpelle le monde de la violence en général et de l'inceste en particulier dans ses premiers romans : *Vu du Ciel* (1990), *Léonore, toujours* (1994). Dans une seconde partie, « Lire l'inceste », nous examinons le rôle du lecteur, de la lectrice, dans l'œuvre d'Angot surtout dans les récits plus récents tels que : *Interview* (1995), *L'Usage de la vie* (1998), *L'Inceste* (1999) et *Quitter la ville* (2000). Pris/e à partie par Angot, la lectrice/le lecteur est alternativement placé/e dans le rôle de l'agressé/e ou dans celui de l'agresseur/e. Ainsi, Angot joue sans cesse à franchir et à garder les limites entre elle et son lecteur/sa lectrice, entre écrire la réalité de l'inceste et sa fiction, ambivalences qui donnent lieu à une nouvelle forme d'écriture dont la force se pressent dans l'interaction entre écrire et lire.

Masque et mascarade dans *Leone Leoni* de George Sand

Leone Leoni, réécriture de *Manon Lescaut* est loin d'être un exercice littéraire ludique et innocent. Tout en empruntant apparemment le cadre narratif de *Manon Lescaut*, Sand détourne en fait le message moral de Prévost. Cette étude s'efforce de montrer comment l'auteure utilise le cadre de Venise et de son Carnaval, ainsi que le thème du masque, pour transgresser le propos de *Manon Lescaut*. En inversant les rôles homme/femme, Sand va plus loin qu'une simple transposition : elle nous donne au final une nouvelle image de la femme qui s'émancipe et choisit librement son destin tout en refusant l'ordre imposé par la société patriarcale.

Maryse Condé est plus connue pour ses romans que pour son œuvre dramatique qui est pourtant prolifique : elle est l'auteure de neuf pièces dont la moitié environ sont éditées et qui ont, pour certaines, été créées aux Antilles, en France et parfois aux États-Unis. Les thèmes abordés par l'écrivain dans ses pièces sont identiques à ceux traités dans ses œuvres romanesques, offrant un tableau réaliste, pas toujours très élogieux, de la société antillaise, soulignant ses travers, dévoilant ses secrets, révélant ses tabous. Dans cet entretien, Maryse Condé nous parle des raisons qui ont motivé sa décision de s'orienter vers le théâtre, des attaches qui la lient à la Guadeloupe, des sujets qu'il lui tient à cœur d'aborder dans son théâtre, du rapport entre les sexes, de l'inceste, de l'histoire et de sa passion pour Haïti. Elle parle aussi du rapport entre les langues (français/créole), de la réception de ses pièces en Guadeloupe et à l'étranger, de sa collaboration avec les metteurs en scène guadeloupéens, et de sa toute dernière pièce intitulée *Oratorio créole* qui n'a toujours pas été créée à ce jour.
