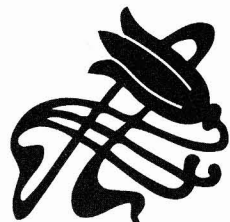

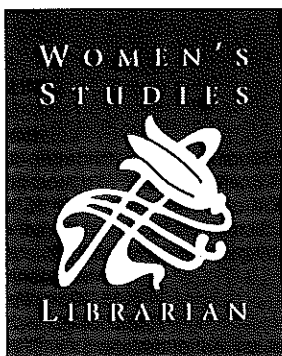

Periodical literature is the cutting edge of women's scholarship, feminist theory, and much of women's culture. *Feminist Periodicals: A Current Listing of Contents* is published by the Office of the University of Wisconsin System Women's Studies Librarian on a quarterly basis with the intent of increasing public awareness of feminist periodicals. It is our hope that *Feminist Periodicals* will serve several purposes: to keep the reader abreast of current topics in feminist literature; to increase readers' familiarity with a wide spectrum of feminist periodicals; and to provide the requisite bibliographic information should a reader wish to subscribe to a journal or to obtain a particular article at her library or through interlibrary loan. (Users will need to be aware of the limitations of the new copyright law with regard to photocopying of copyrighted materials.)

Table of contents pages from current issues of major feminist journals are reproduced in each issue of *Feminist Periodicals*, preceded by a comprehensive annotated listing of all journals we have selected. As publication schedules vary enormously, not every periodical will have table of contents pages reproduced in each issue of *FP*. The annotated listing provides the following information on each journal:

1. Year of first publication.
2. Frequency of publication.
3. U.S. subscription price(s).
4. Subscription address.
5. Current editor.
6. Editorial address (if different from subscription address).
7. International Standard Serials Number (ISSN).
8. OCLC, Inc. Control Number.
9. Selected publications in which the journal is indexed.
10. Selected fulltext products in which publication appears or vendor intermediaries who make the full text available.
11. Subject focus/statement of purpose of the journal.

Please note that in the actual text, only the numbers 1 to 11 are used to identify the different categories of information.

Our goal in *FP* is to represent English-language periodicals from around the world that focus on women's studies or women's issues. Generally, we do not include mainstream newsstand magazines. We are also unable to include periodicals that lack a complete table of contents. We encourage feminist serials to build a full table of contents into their regular format to facilitate possible inclusion in *FP* and indexing elsewhere.

Interested readers will find more complete information on feminist periodicals in *DWM: A Directory of Women's Media*, published by the National Council for Research on Women (530 Broadway at Spring Street, New York, NY 10012); and in *Women's Periodicals and Newspapers: A Union List of the Holdings of Madison Area Libraries*, edited by James P. Danky and compiled by Maureen E. Hady, Barry Christopher, and Neill E. Strache (Boston: G.K. Hall, 1982).

Suggestions for improvements of *Feminist Periodicals* are gratefully received. We would particularly appreciate assistance from readers in the UW System with our efforts to keep the holding information complete and up to date. Please let us know about new subscriptions, subscriptions we have overlooked, cancellations, or other pertinent information. *Feminist Periodicals* is also available on microfilm at the library of the State Historical Society of Wisconsin.

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## The Experience of Loneliness of Battered Old Women

*The present article is part of a larger study examining the life stories of battered old women (Buchbinder & Winterstein, 2003; Winterstein, 2002). It is based on long in-depth interviews with twenty-one aging women who lived with violence for a significant portion of their lives. While the larger study examines a broad range of their experience, including loneliness, regret, expectations of the future, and an attempt to build a monument to their suffering, the present study focuses on loneliness, which appears to constitute the central theme of their existential experience. Content analysis of the interviews shows that loneliness is experienced on all ecological levels, including the self, the family of origin, the violent partner, the children, and the extended family. It also permeates the social relationships of the women and becomes the predominant motif of their social interactions. The combination of loneliness, violence, and old age creates suffering that colors everyday life and becomes not only the constant background against which life unfolds but also the governing variable in their experience. Their cognitive maps, emotional world, and overall sense of self, as well as their sense of existential continuity in the world are all affected by loneliness.*

*The purpose of this phenomenological study was to describe the experience of older women relative to trusting hired non-professional home-care helpers. Open-ended interviews were done about the home-care experience with 25 women over three years, and 14 women (age 80-93) shared data about hiring and trusting helpers. The women perceived risks to personal safety that adversely influenced willingness to seek new helpers. After hiring a helper, the women were still trying to discern whether the helper could be trusted. Primary-care providers should enable older women to recognize and reduce the risk of having helpers and to monitor helpers' behavior, as well as assessing the psychosocial status of women who have such helpers.*

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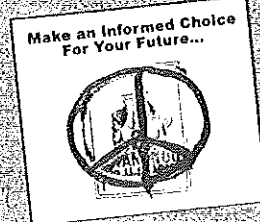
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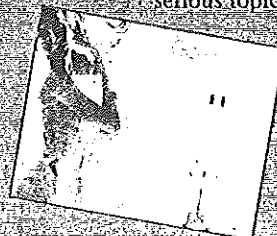
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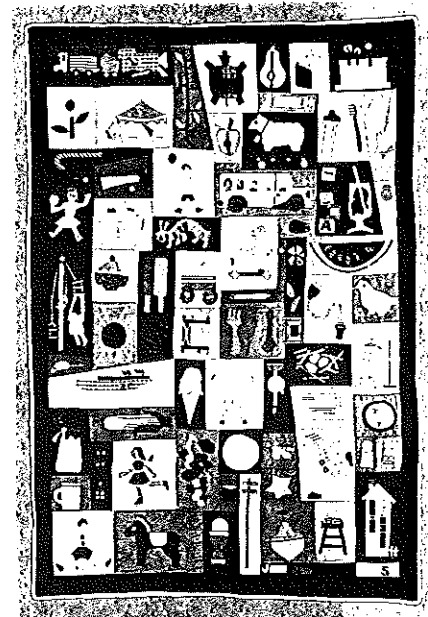
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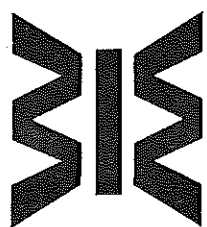
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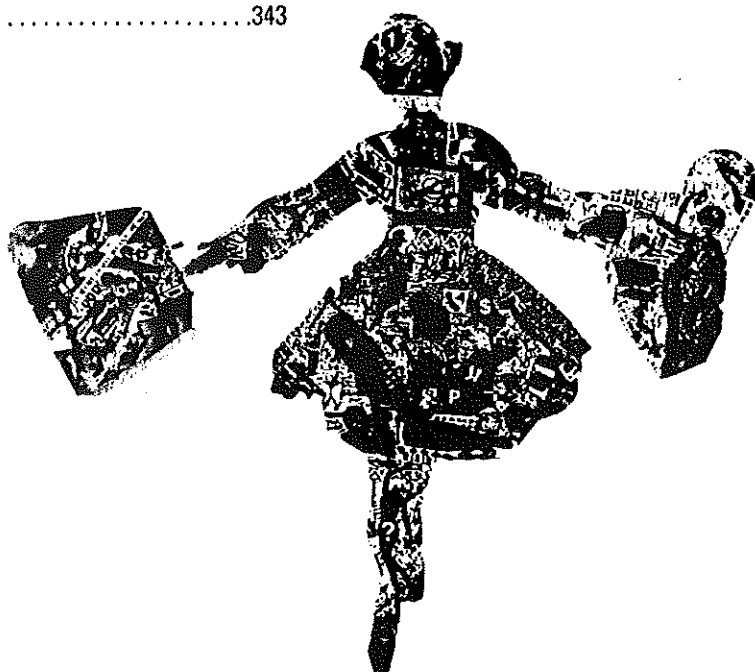
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### Scandalous Rhetorics: Preaching Plain Style in Marguerite de Navarre

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Marguerite de Navarre is rightly renowned for her short stories, spiritual poems and songs and late-medieval theater. However, Marguerite's evangelical faith had an influence on her writing that has not formerly been recognized in terms of its practical application to narrative. In the sixteenth century, evangelicals were Catholics who strove to renew the Church from within, through the application of techniques coming out of the Reformation: extensive reading of Scripture even by the laity, the doctrine of justification by grace, a distrust of clergy corruption. This essay argues that Marguerite's *Heptameron*, and the model she provides in it for the intersection of sacred and profane concerns, actually functions as a homiletical manual to teach the rudiments of good Protestant preaching.

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### Que me veux-tu? What do you want of me?: Claude Cahun's *Autoportraits* and the Process of Gender Identification

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### (Trans)Mutations: Alchemy as undercurrent in Hélène Cixous's *Le jour où je n'étais pas là*

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"À la place de l'écriture: mon fils, le commandant fantôme de l'écriture." Taking the phantom of her first-born son, a Down's syndrome child and his phantom writing as the premise of her autobiographical fiction, *Le jour où je n'étais pas là*, Hélène Cixous prepares the reader for an uncanny and turbulent journey. The underlying force of the narration is found in the "absent presence" of this child, who in his absence (in life and in death) haunts the narrator and the text itself. This "absent presence," as well as, the opposed "present absence," echoes the central endeavor of the ancient hermetic science of Alchemy, which is to render what is invisible visible and vice versa. Indeed the tenets of alchemy prove to be an ideal theoretical framework through which to follow the phantom text. This article, then, proposes a reading of the

autobiographical fiction through the lens of alchemical doctrines and by doing so, echoes the work of the alchemists in attempting to reveal the intangible—the phantom writing—within the tangible. The essential concept of "transmutation" as it collides with that of "mutation," in all its senses, is revealed not only as a dominant theme of the text, but describes the very processes of Cixousian production.

### Anne Hébert et Guylaine Dionne, Deux interprétations opposées des mêmes *Fous de Bassan*

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Parce que Guylaine Dionne montre dans son film *Les Fantômes des trois Madelaine* le même Morusbaasanus qui reparait constamment dans le roman *Les Fous de Bassan* d'Anne Hébert, on est tenté de conclure que l'expression de la sensibilité artistique de Dionne a quelque chose en commun avec celle d'Anne Hébert. Et de fait, ce qui nous concernera le plus ici ce sont bien ces fameux oiseaux, les fous de Bassan, qui font que ces deux oeuvres, le roman d'Anne Hébert et le film de Guylaine Dionne, nous forcent à un rapprochement. Dans les deux cas on peut prétendre aussi que cet oiseau se distingue comme représentant de la nature sauvage, comme présence fantomatique attachée aux mécanismes de la mémoire, et comme modèle paradigmatique de la famille.

### Pour une (re)lecture du *Temps des madras* de Françoise Ega

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Dans *La Parole des femmes* (1979), Maryse Condé soulignait l'idéalisme du *Temps des madras* (1966) de Françoise Ega et, plus récemment, Hélène Sanko en a offert une analyse exotique. Sans réfuter entièrement ces deux jugements, cet essai vise à les compléter, à les nuancer et à proposer une autre lecture du texte d'Ega. En analysant les figures tutélaires qui y sont décrites, on peut dégager une perspective gynocentrée et une critique discrète des stéréotypes coloniaux et sexistes mitigeant l'idéalisation sans réserve relevée par Condé. On peut alors envisager le récit d'Ega dans la lignée des précurseurs auxquels les auteurs de *L'Éloge de la Créolité* font allusion. Par ailleurs, une comparaison entre *Le Temps des madras* et le récit autobiographique de Condé, *Le Coeur à rire et à pleurer* (1999), met en relief les similitudes et les différences entre les deux auteures et permet de mieux comprendre la critique de Condé.

### Reading "Pré-histoire de Ken" in Ken Bogul's *Le Baobab fou*

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*Le Baobab fou* is arguably the most subversive autobiographical narrative ever published since the emergence in the 1970s of sub-Saharan francophone literature written by women authors. The writer, Mariétou M'Baye, better known under the pseudonym Ken Bogul, begins her narrative with a first part written in the third-person singular, entitled "Pré-histoire de Ken." This second and last part itself begins with a short preamble that recapitulates the events told in the prehistory part. One may wonder, then, why Ken's autobiographical account does not simply begin with its second part. In this essay, I analyze the novel's first part, "Pré-histoire de Ken," in an attempt to unravel its meaning as well as to broaden our understanding of its significance for the remainder of the novel. Ultimately, Ken Bogul's strategic prehistory narrative constitutes the basis of Ken Bogul's distinctive voice, which I define.

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« L'aventure Il manderait » Désir de communication dans les Lais de Marie de France

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An important role is conferred to the desire for communication shared by the women characters staged in the narrative of the lais *Aüstic*, *Milun*, *Yonec* and *Eliduc* written in the 12<sup>th</sup> century by the first French woman poet Marie de France. Women's desire for communication, hint of their aspiration for power, appears in the lais in various forms: discourse, correspondence, artistic media, and other subterfuges used to counter the imposed silence, a silence itself echoed and underlined by the shadows, the ellipses created by the narrator of the lais, hence raising many interrogations regarding their interpretation.

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Alongside the perennial chestnuts of <i>La Sylphide</i> and <i>Giselle</i> , as well as such other Northern and Gothic successes in Marie Taglioni's repertoire, Romantic ballet in the 1830s and 40s forwarded an array of representations of the devil, showcasing female dancers and protagonists in devilish plots. With the female sex under scrutiny during the July Monarchy, the two ballets examined here— <i>Le Diable boiteux</i> (1836) and <i>Le Diable amoureux</i> (1840)—ultimately project role models that cohere with the dominant gendered expectations. However, throughout their gothic plots drawn from literary classics or constructed to witness <i>en abîme</i> contemporaneous socio-political problematics, the ballets presented alternative life choices and patterns. As the devil herself, or the devil's advocate, the ballet dancer wearing the pants or revealing short skirts stepped into stories in which she performed and displayed a variety of gendered associations, mirroring the audience members' own hidden, flaunted and open relationships with women of differing socio-economic standings.	

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The dialogues and conversations that find concrete form in artists' books invite readers to extend their understanding of the reading process, suggesting the need to build into their responses reactions to the physical presentation of the work, the feel of the paper, the use of folds and pop-ups, and above all the disposition of words and images. In this article I explore some of the aspects of this invitation to read differently through the work of two women artists whose conversations with poets and with other artists have left a visible and palpable trace in contemporary publications.	

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### Le Regard dans l'œuvre romanesque de Marie Susini

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L'importance du regard dans la fiction de Marie Susini ne se lit pas seulement à travers quelques titres de romans tels que <i>Le premier regard</i> ou <i>Les yeux fermés</i> , mais aussi dans toute son œuvre, fondamentalement visuelle, que ce soit d'un point de vue phénoménologique ou social. Le regard phénoménologique confère à l'univers un caractère nébuleux. Il se voit doté de capacités transformatrices qui permettent un jeu incessant entre différentes dimensions de la vie qui s'agencent en une succession d'images se superposant et se juxtaposant par un acte volontaire de l'être percevant. Le regard social est frappé d'une scission dans son essence même: il est unificateur lorsqu'il consolide les liens entre les membres d'une communauté spécifique, mais une force négative lorsqu'il opère un hiatus entre les indigènes et les étrangers ou entre mère et fille. Finalement, l'écriture n'est qu'un instrument pour transformer les phénomènes en une linéarité survolable, parcourable, dicible.	

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## The Woman Writer and Her Hats: Colette's "Le Képi"

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Colette's short story "Le Képi," published in 1943, is based on an anecdote first included in *La Vagabonde*. Written when she was a mature and established writer in her seventies who had already come to terms with growing old, "Le Képi" features a pre-Claudine Colette-like narrator and an aging woman writer of cheap romances named Marco. Marco is a ghostwriter whose work is published under another name, similar to the way Willy operated his *ateliers*. The narrator

provides fashion advice and support to Marco who has a brief affair with a young lieutenant before losing him when she playfully dons his cap. This experience impacts her writing, which nevertheless remains inauthentic. Colette's own beginnings as a writer are embedded in this story, which uses the example of Marco to shed light on Colette's own evolution into a writer.

## V. LITERATURE AND THEORY TODAY

### Plugging the Hole in Cognitive Theory: Irigaray's Ethical Solution for Gender Blindness

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George Lakoff and Mark Johnson's *Philosophy in the Flesh: The Embodied Mind and Its Challenge to Western Thought* makes important claims for the role of embodiment in cognition, yet the authors mobilize the category of embodiment while ignoring gender as an analytical category. After outlining some of the fundamental premises of their work that prove useful for shaking up students' preconceptions about language, truth, and how we think, this essay proposes suggestions for expanding their critique of traditional conceptions of cognition by taking into account feminist critiques of the universal body and reason. Particularly pertinent are Luce Irigaray's insights into the ways Western philosophers have consistently erected explanatory systems using a male sexual morphology disguised behind a supposedly universal speaking subject. This essay argues that, rather than simply account for gender in Lakoff and Johnson's system within a specific category (e.g., that of primary metaphor), gender may be explored as the blind spot opening up their theory to a re-alliance of epistemology and ethics, Irigaray's primary goal in theorizing sexual difference. Such an intervention shows how Lakoff and Johnson's redefinition of reason could provide empirical evidence and theoretical support for feminist attempts to debunk the sex/gender system and its mainstays, such as the masculine generic.

### Un Enjeu majeur du langage : Usage androcentrique ou parité linguistique en français

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En ce qui concerne la dénomination humaine, l'opinion et l'usage anglo-saxons ont tranché en faveur du non-marquage en genre, ce que facilite le non-marquage des articles et pronoms *the, a/an* et *they*. Ce n'est pas le cas du français et une évolution se dessine en France vers la dénomination professionnelle spécifique de la femme et de l'homme : *la rectrice de l'Université / le recteur de l'Université*. L'enseignement du français langue étrangère doit prendre en compte cette évolution. Enseignantes et enseignants de français se heurtent alors aux problèmes d'une norme archaïque soutenue par des analyses grammaticales préscientifiques autant qu'aux excès d'une « féminisation » systématique, en même temps qu'à la nécessité d'évaluer les ambiguïtés du masculin dit « générique » français. La lecture de trois textes

d'écrivaines françaises et francophones donnera des pistes pédagogiques à travers l'analyse des implications théoriques de leurs pratiques langagières, et permettra de conclure sur les enjeux sociologiques de la question tels qu'ils ont été mis en lumière en particulier par Pierre Bourdieu, et que l'usage linguistique anglo-saxon semble contourner.

### Antéchristique Amélie Nothomb : De rire, de guerre et des femmes dans *Le Sabotage amoureux*

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La fort prolifique écrivaine belge, Amélie Nothomb semble se complaire dans l'exploration des thèmes et situations les plus sinistres : assassinat lardé d'amours incestueuses, crime passionnel parfait de la femme aimée des mains de son propre mari, strangulations diverses, emprisonnements et autres lavages de cerveau... On est en droit de se demander comment une telle écriture, d'érudition effrénée et d'humour glacial, pourrait bien servir, par exemple, la cause des femmes, ou plus généralement toute recherche vers l'avènement d'une justice un peu humaine. Si l'on a su reconnaître chez Amélie Nothomb le projet d'une réécriture moderne des grands mythes humains de l'antiquité, quelle serait la part laissée à un humanisme que Simone de Beauvoir aurait également désiré pénétrer de 'féminisme' ? « Antéchristique » en apparence, l'écriture d'Amélie Nothomb pourrait-elle, par un détour belliqueux et humoristique, servir à la fois la cause des femmes et un idéal pacifiste ? Telle est la question explorée dans la présente étude consacrée au *Sabotage amoureux*.

### Identification, Identity and Allegiance in Amélie Nothomb's *Stupeur et tremblements* and *Métaphysique des tubes*

Amélie Nothomb (born 1967) is arguably Belgium's best-known contemporary author. A self-confessed "graphomane," who publishes one novel a year, Nothomb has enjoyed considerable success since the publication of her first novel *Hygiène de l'assassin* in 1992. In this paper, I examine two of Nothomb's autobiographical works, *Stupeur et tremblements* (1999) and *Métaphysique des tubes* (2000). In these, Nothomb negotiates issues of identification, identity and allegiance as she constructs her identity as the daughter of a Belgian diplomat within a Japanese cultural framework. The resulting articulation of different identificatory processes, creation of structures of allegiance, transgression of both real and invisible boundaries and renegotiation of conflicting loyalties results in a constant repositioning of individual identity. This essay identifies these works as examples of what has recently been called an "accented literature." It further explores parallels between Naficy's cinematographic paradigm and Nothomb's literary one and evaluates the extent to which Nothomb can be said to be an accented writer.

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In Marie Jeanne Riccoboni's *Histoire d'Ernestine* (1765) and *Lettres d'Elisabeth Sophie de Vallière à Louise Hortence de Canteleu, son amie* (1772), mothers and substitute mothers die in the first paragraph. Their emblematic death serves as the catalyst for plots that to a varying extent, this essay argues, should be considered eloquent examples of the "covert female rebellion" of late eighteenth-century women writers analyzed by Joan Hinde Stewart in *Gynographs*. Although the mother's story constitutes an all-important element in *Lettres d'Elisabeth Sophie de Vallière*, substitute mothers in fact raise and educate the heroines of both novels. In dialogue with April Alliston's *Virtue's Faults*, this essay analyzes the function of these (substitute) mothers in creating feminocentric plots that undermine male-sanctioned traditions and rebel against, for instance, the transmission of patronymics.

Fallen Women? Femininity and Virtue in Delphine Gay de Girardin's  
*Lady Tartuffe*

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Remembered for her career as a journalist and salonnière, Delphine Gay de Girardin has been largely ignored by current literary criticism. Although all of her comedies merit reconsideration as poignant examples of a woman writer's subversive use of wit, *Lady Tartuffe* (1852) best demonstrates how Girardin reconstructed traditional ideas of gender. Girardin's multi-dimensional, female Tartuffe forces us to consider hypocrisy and women's honor with new perspective. We must consider the title character first in light of the constraints imposed upon her gender. She acts, not out of spite, but rather desperation to conceal her tarnished reputation from men who determine her financial survival. By examining previously ignored indications of Lady Tartuffe's ambiguous nature and by considering her foil, the innocent, fifteen year-old Jeanne, the title character emerges as a more sympathetic figure. In addition, a reconsideration of the often criticized final act leads to an illumination of Girardin's subtle, yet subversive attack on a patriarchal society that infantilizes women.

'Pour nous, rien que la raillerie et l'insulte': The Courtesan Writes Back  
in the Autobiography of Céleste Mogador

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In her autobiography, the *demi-mondaine* Céleste Mogador, courtesan at the height of her fame and power in the mid-1850s, countered the misogynistic stereotypes of prostitutes as heartless and vacuous *filles de marbre*. Mogador privileged the prostitute's response to her own alienation during a period when male writers purposely denigrated the hetaera. Indeed, her autobiography

underscored her unconventional life and career outside of the socially sanctioned domestic sphere of motherhood and marriage, thereby exacerbating the backlash against *demi-mondaines* generated by writers such as Alexandre Dumas fils, the Goncourts, and Eugène Sue. These writers, still shaken by the feminist activity staged during the upheaval of 1848, associated the *demi-mondaine* with the demand for female enfranchisement and independence and thus fabricated myths about pitiless *demi-mondaines* to damper these women's purported impact on society. To offset these stereotypes, Mogador employed examples from her own life and those of her peers to expose societal prejudices against women.

The Metamorphoses of Philomel

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This essay examines how, from Marie de France on, the myth of Philomel has haunted the female literary imagination. A metaphor for the situation of the woman writer and her strategies for circumventing society's demand for her silence, Philomel's story as told in Ovid's *Metamorphoses* is itself metamorphosed in women's literature. At times it combines with other myths, as cultural contexts and mentalities evolve. The metamorphoses of the myth highlight poetically the changing characteristics of women's writing and its developing relationship to literary tradition. Intimations of brutal silencing and revenge (Philomel's rape and mutilation by her brother-in-law Tereus, reprisal through weaving, infanticide and cannibalism) eventually give way to motifs of flight and song without reference to patriarchal violence (transformed into a nightingale and swallow respectively, Philomel and her sister Procne escape from Tereus's pursuit and sing). This evolution is traced in texts by women writers from Marie de France to Monique Wittig. In recent works focused on women's relationship to writing, the myth lingers on in wordplay signifying that the woman writer has gone beyond gendered roles and patriarchal plots, that hers is a voice whose freedom depends not on the metamorphosis of bodies but on that of words and texts.

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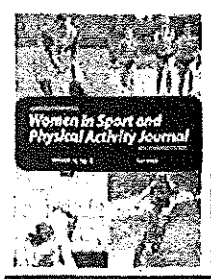
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
