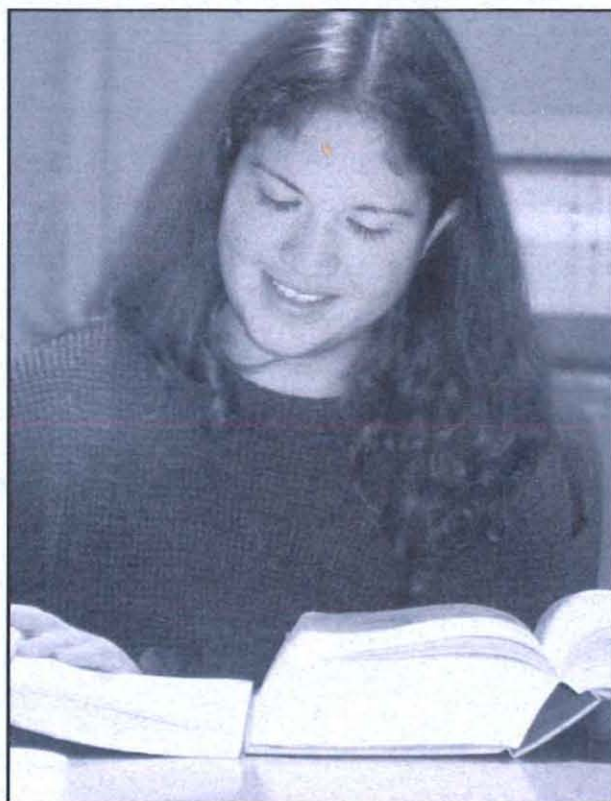

# Feminist Periodicals

Periodical literature is the cutting edge of women's scholarship, feminist theory, and much of women's culture. *Feminist Periodicals: A Current Listing of Contents* is published by the Office of the University of Wisconsin System Women's Studies Librarian on a quarterly basis with the intent of increasing public awareness of feminist periodicals. It is our hope that *Feminist Periodicals* will serve several purposes: to keep the reader abreast of current topics in feminist literature; to increase readers' familiarity with a wide spectrum of feminist periodicals; and to provide the requisite bibliographic information should a reader wish to subscribe to a journal or to obtain a particular article at her library or through interlibrary loan. (Users will need to be aware of the limitations of the new copyright law with regard to photocopying of copyrighted materials.)

Table of contents pages from current issues of major feminist journals are reproduced in each issue of *Feminist Periodicals*, preceded by a comprehensive annotated listing of all journals we have selected. As publication schedules vary enormously, not every periodical will have table of contents pages reproduced in each issue of *FP*. The annotated listing provides the following information on each journal:

1. Year of first publication.
2. Frequency of publication.
3. Subscription prices (print only; for online prices, consult publisher).
4. Subscription address.
5. Current editor.
6. Editorial address (if different from subscription address).
7. International Standard Serials Number (ISSN).
8. OCLC, Inc. Control Number.
9. Selected publications in which the journal is indexed.
10. Selected fulltext products in which publication appears or vendor intermediaries who make the full text available.
11. Subject focus/statement of purpose of the journal.

Please note that in the actual text, only the numbers 1 to 11 are used to identify the different categories of information.

Our goal in *FP* is to represent English-language periodicals from around the world that focus on women's studies or women's issues. Generally, we do not include mainstream newsstand magazines. We are also unable to include periodicals that lack a complete table of contents. We encourage feminist serials to build a full table of contents into their regular format to facilitate possible inclusion in *FP* and indexing elsewhere.

Interested readers will find more complete information on feminist periodicals in *DWM: A Directory of Women's Media*, published by the National Council for Research on Women (530 Broadway at Spring Street, New York, NY 10012); and in *Women's Periodicals and Newspapers: A Union List of the Holdings of Madison Area Libraries*, edited by James P. Danky and compiled by Maureen E. Hady, Barry Christopher, and Neill E. Strache (Boston: G.K. Hall, 1982).

Suggestions for improvements of *Feminist Periodicals* are gratefully received. We would particularly appreciate assistance from readers in the UW System with our efforts to keep the holding information complete and up to date. Please let us know about new subscriptions, subscriptions we have overlooked, cancellations, or other pertinent information. *Feminist Periodicals* is also available on microfilm at the library of the State Historical Society of Wisconsin.

## Are We There Yet? The Progress of Women in One Large Law Enforcement Agency Kimberly A. Lonsway

*Women have entered the field of law enforcement in increasing numbers and played a critical role in the development of modern policing. Yet the number of women in law enforcement has remained small and the pace of increase slow. The present study was conducted to evaluate the status of women and their progress within one large law enforcement agency. At the time of the survey administration, only 2.65% of the sworn personnel within this agency were female. Thus, all of the female (N = 69), minority male (N = 293), and a random sample of the white male (N = 301) sworn personnel were administered a lengthy questionnaire assessing their personal and professional characteristics, health and well-being, attitudes toward diversity in policing, and a wide range of experiences and opinions regarding agency policies and practices. Findings suggest that considerable progress has been achieved for women in law enforcement, but barriers continue to exist.*

## Gender and Policing: Do Women Accept Legal Restrictions More Than Their Male Counterparts? John A. Eterno

*The Compstat model, developed in New York City, is an aggressive, crime-fighting style of policing that has been emulated by numerous police agencies. It is argued that Compstat returns policing to a male-dominated model that may lead to illegal behavior (e.g., unlawful searches and seizures) especially by male officers. This research uses the factorial survey method with a large sample of New York City police officers—234 females out of 1,259—to study similarities and differences between male and female officers' legal behaviors. Although both men and women are influenced by the law, women are more likely to obey legal restrictions in weapon situations.*

## Portrait in Blue: A Demographic and Behavioral Profile of Police Sexual Harassers Sue Carter Collins

*Extant research indicates that women who work in traditional male dominated fields are more likely to be subjected to sexual harassment by their male colleagues. Female police officers are no exception. Although there is empirical evidence that women in general may exhibit certain characteristics that make them more or less vulnerable to sexual harassment victimization, little is known about male police officers that commit these offenses. The primary purpose of this article is to enhance existing knowledge by presenting a demographic and behavioral profile of male police officers in the state of Florida who were found guilty of sexual harassment by their law enforcement employers. The article begins with a brief review of the research on sexual harassment in policing and a general description of harasser traits and characteristics, which was taken from the social psychological and interpersonal aggression literature. Following is an articulation of the study's methodology and results. The article concludes with a discussion of policy implications and recommendations for future research.*

## Female Police Officers' Job-Related Attitudes: A Comparative Study of Taiwan and the United States Doris Chu Ivan Y. Sun

*Although there has been a growing interest recently in the role of women in policing, very few empirical studies have examined female officers' job-related attitudes from a cross-cultural perspective. Using interview and survey data collected from two Taiwanese and two American police departments, this research assesses Taiwanese and American female officers' attitudes toward co-workers, promotion, and citizens. The findings show that Taiwanese female officers are more likely than their American counterparts to have friends in work units but less willing to share information with co-workers. Taiwanese women police are also found to be more likely than American women police to consider promotion an important issue in their career. Taiwanese officers are more critical of citizens than American officers. Limitations of this study and implications for future research are discussed.*

## Women in Parole: Gendered Adaptations of Female Parole Agents in California Connie Ireland Bruce Berg

*More women than ever are present today in correctional occupations. Women have been promoted to higher ranks, in part due to structural changes that have granted women legitimate access to promotion. However, attitudes, training, working environment, and social dynamics remain laden with gender barriers for women in correctional occupations. This article examines gender barriers for women in parole. The study uses semi-structured interviews with a convenience sample of female parole agents hired between 1960 and 2003 in California. Common themes include subjects' perceived obstacles and the limited presence of women in administrative positions. The results suggest an adjustment typology which included overcompensation, reinforcement of feminine stereotypes, and political correctness. The results suggest policy implications and directions for future research.*
