

NEWS OF THE SCHOOL


Professor Roger C. Cramton of Cornell Law School will be the first Warren P. Knowles Professor at our School. The estate of the late **Governor Knowles** ('33) created the professorship in the area of ethics in government and law. Proceeds from the professorship will be used to bring distinguished visitors to the Law School for teaching and scholarship. Prof. Cramton will be here in the fall of 1997. A former clerk to U.S. Supreme Court Justice Harold Burton (1956-57), former dean at Cornell (1973-80), and noted author, Prof. Cramton is a most appropriate choice to inaugurate this professorship.

U.S. Attorney for the Eastern District of Wisconsin, **Thomas P. Schneider** ('72), recently negotiated a substantial "gift" to the Law School as part of a sentencing package in a federal conspiracy case. Schneider included a "community service payment" of \$100,000, equally split by Wisconsin's two law schools, to fund programs on business law ethics.

Prof. Frank Tuerkheimer reports that **Kim Mayer**, a current third-year student, recently won a reversal for an indigent defendant. Mayer was supervised by Tuerkheimer on the appeal of a case to the Seventh Circuit Court of Appeals under the Criminal Justice Act. The issue involved sentencing procedures.

Charles F. Luce ('41) recently made a major gift to the Law School to complete funding of the J. Willard Hurst Professorship in Legal History. Luce, Hurst's first student research assistant, retired as chairman and chief executive officer of Consolidated Edison in New York in 1982.

The Consumer Law Project announces that **David Vladeck**, an attorney with the Public Citizen Litigation Group, will be the consumer-advocate-in-residence in early March 1997. Mr. Vladeck, a graduate of Columbia University Law School, will give a general law school talk, meet with faculty, and be available to guest lecture in a number of classes during his stay.
