If your museum is part of a larger cultural institution, please respond to the questions in this survey in reference only to your museum.

For the purpose of this survey, a <u>controlled online collection</u> is defined as a network accessible collection of digital materials where: access to the collection is controlled, or use of the digitized materials is controlled.

Controls may be implemented through a variety of tools including metadata, resolution limits, watermarking, streaming, registration requirements, pop ups, etc.

<u>Access controls</u> restrict who can access your online collection, or from where and when they can access it. For example, access restrictions might require payment of a fee prior to gaining access to materials, or it may restrict access to officially registered users.

<u>Use controls</u> restrict what users can do with the online collections they have access to. For example use controls may restrict whether users can print or save materials in your collection.

The definition of controlled online collections **EXCLUDES**:

- Collections of licensed or subscription-based digital materials to which you provide access.
- Digital materials primarily for internal staff use.
- Completely unrestricted online digital collections.
