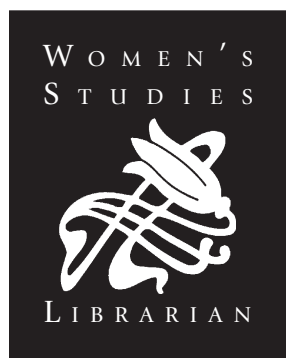

# Feminist Periodicals

## A Current Listing of Contents

Volume 30, Number 1 (Winter 2010)

Periodical literature is the cutting edge of women's scholarship, feminist theory, and much of women's culture. *Feminist Periodicals: A Current Listing of Contents* is published by the Office of the University of Wisconsin System Women's Studies Librarian on a quarterly basis with the intent of increasing public awareness of feminist periodicals. It is our hope that *Feminist Periodicals* will serve several purposes: to keep the reader abreast of current topics in feminist literature; to increase readers' familiarity with a wide spectrum of feminist periodicals; and to provide the requisite bibliographic information should a reader wish to subscribe to a journal or to obtain a particular article at her library or through interlibrary loan. (Users will need to be aware of the limitations of copyright law with regard to photocopying of copyrighted materials.)

Table of contents pages from current issues of major feminist journals are reproduced in each issue of *Feminist Periodicals*, followed by a comprehensive annotated listing of all journals we have selected. As publication schedules vary enormously, not every periodical will have table of contents pages reproduced in each issue of *FP*. The annotated listing provides the following information on each journal:

1. Year of first publication.
2. Frequency of publication.
3. Subscription prices (print only; for online prices, consult publisher).
4. Subscription address.
5. Current editor.
6. Editorial address (if different from subscription address).
7. International Standard Serials Number (ISSN).
8. OCLC, Inc. Control Number.
9. Selected publications in which the journal is indexed.
10. Selected fulltext products in which publication appears or vendor intermediaries who make the full text available.
11. Subject focus/statement of purpose of the journal.

Please note that in the actual text, only the numbers 1 to 11 are used to identify the different categories of information.

Our goal in *Feminist Periodicals* is to represent English-language periodicals from around the world that focus on gender, women's studies, or women's issues. Generally, we do not include mainstream newsstand magazines. We are also unable to include periodicals that lack a complete table of contents. We encourage feminist serials to build a full table of contents into their regular format to facilitate possible inclusion in *FP* and indexing elsewhere.

**University of Wisconsin System users:** To locate these periodicals within the UW System, do a UW System/Universal Borrowing search from your campus catalog (labeled variously "Other Libraries," "More Libraries," "Other Catalogs," "Other UW Catalogs," etc.) If information on actual holdings (volumes and issues) is not in the records retrieved, contact the Reference Department at the library of interest.

Suggestions for improvements of *Feminist Periodicals* are gratefully received. We would particularly appreciate assistance from readers in the UW System with our efforts to keep the holding information complete and up to date. Please let us know about new subscriptions, subscriptions we have overlooked, cancellations, or other pertinent information.

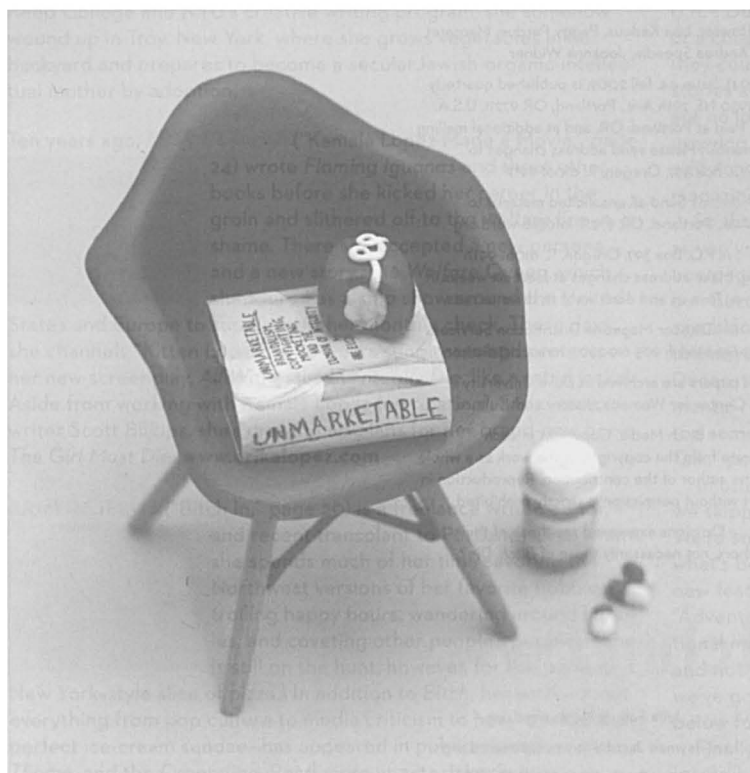

Vishakha Gandhi is a Montreal-born academic, visual artist, and writer who is currently completing her doctorate in English at York University. She has exhibited her visual art at the Annual Graduate Women's Studies Student Association Symposium, *Lunar Eclipse: A Night of Words and Art* at the Toronto Women's Bookstore, Linux Café, and in School Magazine. She plans to mount another solo exhibition at Alternative Grounds in the upcoming year. Her portfolio can be viewed at [www.myspace.com/dripping-orientalism](http://www.myspace.com/dripping-orientalism).

"As someone knowledgeable of postcolonial studies, I find myself in a vexed position in relation to elements that might be considered South Asian in style or imagery. To this end, I have created an aesthetic that I call 'dripping orientalism,' that includes lush colours, Indocentric iconography such as lotus flowers, and Hindi or Gujarati script. However, the viewer's gaze is interrupted by what appears to be blood drips and splatters; these drips illustrate the violence of western consumption of the East. In the painting "I Bite my Tongue (on the vowels)," this violence is twofold, as I reference my childhood frustration at being taught the Hindi vowels over and over by inept teachers. "Paisley" is the quintessential Indian pattern revisited in the opulence of gold, orange, and yellow. Here, the paisleys create a riotous swirl across the canvas, unlike the more ordered paisley patterns that are seen traditionally in Indian art. Both paintings contain within them a longing and a desire; they speak to a desire to both see old forms in new, decadent ways, and to attempt control on how the viewer receives the art."

##### Marguerite de Navarre and Religious Reform in Sixteenth-Century France

In the enthusiastic *élan* of the Renaissance, everything seemed possible. Belief in man's infinite capacity for understanding led to the ever-greater questioning of the Church and its practices. While in intellectual circles of the day, the ideas of Luther and Calvin began to circulate, Evangelicals argued for the restitution of the wellspring of religion, the Bible. One practitioner of *devotio moderna* was the sister of King François I of France, Marguerite de Navarre. By means of a configurational model developed by Eugene E. White, this article examines the theologically-assertive nature of the Queen of Navarre's collection of *nouvelles*, *L'Heptaméron*, and questions its efficacy on the subject of affecting religious reforms in sixteenth century France.

##### Shifting Pictures of Class, Gender, and Self in Mademoiselle de Montpensier's "Portrait de Monsieur de Brais"

*Catherine J. Lewis Theobald* ..... 30

Largely overlooked in scholarly discourse devoted to the popular *portrait mondain* of the seventeenth century, Mademoiselle de Montpensier's "Portrait de Monsieur de Brais" both nuances and challenges the idealized picture of nobility projected by the *Divers portraits* (1659), the volume in which it first appeared. The social and sexual stakes of this written description of Mademoiselle's head groom encourage us to recognize the portrait book as much more than a mere salon game. Assuming the voice and "body" of her non-noble male servant via a false self-portrait, Mademoiselle performs the transgressions suggested in other period depictions of her. The text thus presents layers of *trompe-l'œil* that function as a locus for a trans-gendered noble identity—the *persona* of "La Grande Mademoiselle." A consideration of that hybridized figure further illuminates the complex presence-absence dynamic of the portrait. Moreover, this exploration of gender and authorship in the *Divers portraits* nuances our understanding of both the functions of seventeenth-century salon portraiture and the methods of identity-making strategies via text and image.

### **Remarriage and its Discontents: Young Widows in Mme Riccoboni's**

#### **Fiction**

*Ruth P. Thomas* ..... 54

Although victims of unhappy first marriages, the young widowed heroines of Mme Riccoboni's novels do not savor their new found liberty but choose to rewed. I consider here the social and psychological elements that determine the second marriage, and how similar it proves to be to the first, in three of Riccoboni's novels: *L'Histoire du marquis de Cressy*, *Lettres de Milady Juliette Catesby*, and *Lettres d'Adélaïde de Dammartin*. While Riccoboni portrays an aristocratic and idealized society without the financial burdens and practical problems that would beset a real widow in the eighteenth century, her heroines have the same emotional needs and the same desire for happiness as actual widows and are also subject to social prejudices and constraints. They would like to reconcile their quest for independence and control over their own lives with their longing for emotional fulfillment and their romantic ideal, but often they cannot. Women are defined by marriage both in reality and in fiction, and it is society which prevails.

### **Reframing the Void: The Cinematographic Aesthetic of Marguerite Duras's Autobiographical Novels**

*Erica L. Johnson* ..... 66

Both a filmmaker and writer, Marguerite Duras imbues her literary works with a notably cinematographic aesthetic. *L'Amant*, the second and most celebrated of Duras's trio of autobiographical novels about her childhood in French colonial Indochina, is a vividly visual text in its voyeurism, its examination of the colonial gaze, and its presentation of the autobiographical subject through a series of photographs, several of which are "real" and one non-existent. Duras's use of ekphrastic photographs and cinematic scenes serves to decenter, mask, and absent the autobiographical subject insofar as she makes a clean break between image and referent in both cases. Thus, when Jean-Jacques Annaud attempted to suture this break in his film version of *L'Amant* (1991), he compelled Duras to articulate her aesthetic in even stronger visual terms by rewriting *L'Amant* yet again in the form of her final novel, *L'Amant de la Chine du Nord*. This novel proclaims itself "un livre... un film," and remarks on the ways in which the characters are presented as "plus 'pour le cinema' que [ceux] du livre [*L'Amant*]." The essay examines the relationship between Duras's last two autobiographical novels and Annaud's film to reveal the ways in which Duras textualizes photographic and cinematographic images not as a means of fixing an image, but as a means of casting it into the interpretive interregnum of visual and written textuality. In trying to present a singular visual image of Duras's self-portrait in his film, Annaud sparked a battle between his biographical vision and the author's autobiographical vision, as well as Duras's need to splinter the film's images by writing her own cinematographic account of *L'Amant*. In her final novel, then, Duras hones her visual aesthetic and displaces the autobiographical referent in her use of multiple, unfixed, and even inaccessible sites of subjectivity.

**La Mère antillaise : Ouverture ou obstacle à la créolité ?**

*Mariah Devereux Herbeck* ..... 79

La mère antillaise empêche-t-elle ou encourage-t-elle « la totale acception » de la créolité ? Dans *Eloge de la Créolité* (1989), Jean Bernabé, Patrick Chamoiseau et Raphaël Confiant citent et rendent hommage aux grands auteurs antillais bien connus — dont Aimé Césaire et Edouard Glissant — et identifient « les auteurs créoles » dont ils font partie comme des « fils antillais », voire des « fils d'Aimé Césaire » (EC 18). Or, à la suite d'une lecture approfondie du manifeste, force est de remarquer l'absence frappante de figures féminines positives — qu'elles soient « filles » ou « mères » — et ce en dépit du fait qu'une *écrivaine* semble adhérer à plusieurs paramètres de la Créolité tels qu'ils sont définis dans *Eloge de la Créolité* : Simone Schwarz-Bart. D'une part, cette analyse visera à montrer comment un roman de celle-ci, *Pluie et vent sur Télumée Miracle*, peut être lu comme un texte avant-coureur de la créolité selon les critères exposés par les auteurs d'*Eloge de la Créolité*. D'autre part, seront étudiées en fonction de la présentation des figures maternelles dans les deux textes les raisons pour lesquelles Bernabé, Chamoiseau et Confiant auraient négligé de citer le roman de Schwarz-Bart dans leur célèbre manifeste.

**Les Filles frappent-elles fort ? : Filles et femmes dans la bande dessinée**

*Titeuf*

*Martine Motard-Noar*..... 92

L'étude de la littérature populaire contemporaine, surtout dans le contexte francophone, doit inclure le neuvième art — les bandes dessinées, qu'elles soient lues par les jeunes ou les moins jeunes. On se doit en particulier d'analyser l'engouement des jeunes Français envers la série *Titeuf*, publiée à partir de 1993, et la place qui y est faite aux filles, dans une collection dont le personnage principal est un petit garçon de dix ans. Le féminin, dans l'univers de *Titeuf*, est un monde très présent mais à part, difficile à comprendre et qui frappe fort, physiquement et verbalement. Le monde féminin, comme le monde masculin, y est représenté sous tous ses âges, mais « l'élément » féminin semble toujours se situer du côté de la supériorité et de la norme. En tant que héros de B.D., *Titeuf* vit évidemment dans le domaine de l'amplification humoristique, surtout dans les situations où il a rapport avec les filles. Cependant, l'invraisemblable ici n'y est pas seulement une fonction de l'humour. En effet, *Titeuf* invite une lecture participative complexe et ambiguë, finalement moins réaliste qu'il n'y paraît et qui ne peut que refléter l'imaginaire narratif d'une collectivité où seul un garçon semble s'imposer comme personnage transgressif, donc expressif.

**The Violence of Desire in Amélie Nothomb's Novels**

*Elizabeth Berglund Hall*..... 103

Amélie Nothomb's novels may be divided into two large categories, the semi-autobiographical and the purely fictive. In each of these two rubrics, her novels follow a similar plot structure in which each member of a couple



torments the other to the point that one of the two cracks and ruptures the pair, usually through an act of violence, either real or imagined. In the two non-autobiographical novels to be considered in this article, *Hygiène de l'assassin* (1992) and *Cosmétique de l'ennemi* (2001), there is also, either in the foreground or background of the plot, a heterosexual couple that is violently broken up by the murder of the woman by the man. In two autobiographical novels written around the same time period, *Le Sabotage amoureux* (1993) and *Stupeur et tremblements* (1999), a homosexual pairing is eventually broken apart by the progressively more serious self-abasement by one of the two women. In each of these examples, violence is intimately associated with desire and pleasure. Because of the dual nature of this violence (inflicted in order to create pain and pleasure, against the self and other), this article aims to consider whether its representation in Nothomb's work reinforces or reinterprets gender stereotypes, taking as a theoretical basis Hélène Cixous's understanding of desire in the "masculine" economy and Julie Kristeva's reading of the abject.

#### **Les écrits de l'intime : l'écrivaine en justicière et criminelle**

*Evelyne Ledoux-Beaugrand and Catherine Mavrikakis* ..... 116

Cet article interroge la prise de parole des femmes à l'intérieur comme à l'extérieur des limites du livre ainsi que la place de l'écrivaine dans la communauté et sous le regard de la loi. À travers l'analyse d'œuvres autofictionnelles contemporaines, il s'agit de saisir les enjeux du privé et du public tel que le livre les pose. Cette entreprise, peu ordinaire à cause de la notoriété des pères, oblige Nimier et Pingeot à prendre connaissance de l'image tant privée que publique de cet individu, renseignements disparates qu'elles confrontent à leurs souvenirs d'enfants peu précis. L'écriture hybride qui en résulte contribue à rétablir une relation filiale, à offrir également à autrui une image complète de leur père et d'elle-même pour se resituer dans un espace public resté trop longtemps inaccessible.

Voilà bientôt un quart de siècle que la question de la laïcité domine l'actualité française, soulevée cette fois non pas par les conflits traditionnels entre l'Etat et l'église catholique comme c'était le cas au début du vingtième siècle, mais par l'arrivée du voile islamique à l'école. Cet essai retrace le contexte historique de la loi sur la laïcité de 1905, son application, et les trois "crises du voile" (1989, 1993 et 2003) ayant mené à la loi sur les signes religieux ostensibles du 15 mars 2004. Sont également analysés les résultats de cette nouvelle loi ainsi que les controverses qu'elle continue à susciter entre les pro-loi et les anti-loi, entre autres, dans l'opinion publique, parmi les féministes, les personnalités politiques, et les syndicats de l'enseignement. Laïcité ou féminisme? La question est loin d'être résolue, puisqu'une nouvelle fois les signes religieux refont surface en 2009, avec la demande d'une soixantaine de députés de la création d'une commission d'enquête parlementaire sur le port de la burqa — le voile intégral — et la mise en place d'une mission d'information sur le sujet.

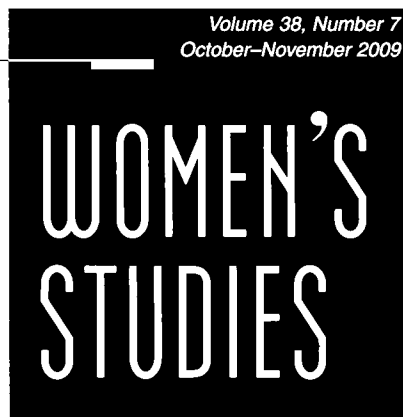
