What's so special about UW-Madison??



- Producing world, national, and state leaders
- Strong history of student activism, shared governance
- Grounded in WI Idea what we do matters

UW-Madison's educational mission...



to produce graduates who possess disciplinary & interdisciplinary knowledge about themselves & the world, and who are

- Critical thinkers & creative problem-solvers
- Actively seeking & applying new knowledge
- Able to adapt to new technologies & situations
- And who remain curious throughout their lives.

This happens through <u>active engagement</u> with peers, faculty, staff, and course material and co-curricular activities.

Elements of Effective Educational Practices Leading to Student Engagement:



- Collaborative and active learning
- Enriching educational experiences
- Interaction with faculty members
- Purposeful peer interactions
- High level of academic challenge coupled with supportive campus environment

Outcomes are even more dramatic for students of color and all those who are less prepared than their peers.

- Adapt campus-wide programs for your department or unit
- Use "partner" vs. "service to" language
- Provide "administrative cover" & partner with others who experiment with new teaching and co-curricular activities (leadership certificate adaptations, service learning opportunities, FYE goal adoption, etc.)
