Periodical literature is the cutting edge of women's scholarship, feminist theory, and much of women's culture. Feminist Periodicals: A Current Listing of Contents is published by the Office of the University of Wisconsin System Women's Studies Librarian on a quarterly basis with the intent of increasing public awareness of feminist periodicals. It is our hope that Feminist Periodicals will serve several purposes: to keep the reader abreast of current topics in feminist literature; to increase readers' familiarity with a wide spectrum of feminist periodicals; and to provide the requisite bibliographic information should a reader wish to subscribe to a journal or to obtain a particular article at her library or through interlibrary loan. (Users will need to be aware of the limitations of copyright law with regard to photocopying of copyrighted materials.)

Table of contents pages from current issues of major feminist journals are reproduced in each issue of *Feminist Periodicals*, followed by a comprehensive annotated listing of all journals we have selected. As publication schedules vary enormously, not every periodical will have table of contents pages reproduced in each issue of *FP*. The annotated listing provides the following information on each journal:

- 1. Year of first publication.
- 2. Frequency of publication.
- 3. Subscription prices (print only; for online prices, consult publisher).
- 4. Subscription address.
- 5. Current editor.
- 6. Editorial address (if different from subscription address).
- 7. International Standard Serials Number (ISSN).
- 8. OCLC, Inc. Control Number.
- 9. Selected publications in which the journal is indexed.
- 10. Selected fulltext products in which publication appears or vendor intermediaries who make the full text available.
- 11. Subject focus/statement of purpose of the journal.

Please note that in the actual text, only the numbers 1 to 11 are used to identify the different categories of information.

Our goal in *Feminist Periodicals* is to represent English-language periodicals from around the world that focus on gender, women's studies, or women's issues. Generally, we do not include mainstream newsstand magazines. We are also unable to include periodicals that lack a complete table of contents. We encourage feminist serials to build a full table of contents into their regular format to facilitate possible inclusion in *FP* and indexing elsewhere.

University of Wisconsin System users: To locate these periodicals within the UW System, do a UW System/Universal Borrowing search from your campus catalog (labeled variously "Other Libraries," "More Libraries," "Other Catalogs," "Other UW Catalogs," etc.) If information on actual holdings (volumes and issues) is not in the records retrieved, contact the Reference Department at the library of interest.

Suggestions for improvements of *Feminist Periodicals* are gratefully received. We would particularly appreciate assistance from readers in the UW System with our efforts to keep the holding information complete and up to date. Please let us know about new subscriptions, subscriptions we have overlooked, cancellations, or other pertinent information.

Re-staging the Revolution: Women and Politics in Virginie Ancelot's *Madame Roland*

Joyce Johnston 45

In early nineteenth-century France, shifting definitions of what drama was meant to be - classical or romantic, modern or melodramatic - made it difficult for any playwright to have works staged. Women dramatists in particular were caught in the middle of the aesthetic debate, torn between producing short, light-hearted works and plays of greater social significance. Successful playwright Virginie Ancelot's 1843 Madame Roland explores the tension between private and public spheres during the French Revolution. In contrast to Ancelot's other domestically inclined heroines, the title character attempts to create political change during the Reign of Terror. However, in considering the title character and her foil the Duchesse de Navailles who does not directly engage in Revolutionary politics, it becomes evident that Ancelot offers dual and contrasting models of the idealized woman. Madame Roland, ignored by contemporary literary criticism, warrants rediscovery as an example of how a woman dramatist was able to stage political ideas regarding women and their participation in public life within a genre that was all but off limits to those of her gender.

Les *Botaniques des dames*, badinage précieux ou initiation scientifique?

Dancing into the Spotlight: Louise Bertin and La Esmeralda

The field of musicology lags far behind literature and the visual arts in the study of its women practitioners. Indeed, it has been nearly forty years since art historian Linda Nochlin published her ground-breaking study, "Why Have There Been No Great Women Artists?" with its remarkable parallel implications for women composers. This essay attempts to address this question by studying the life and work of Louise-Angélique Bertin—the only composer to collaborate directly with Victor Hugo on an opera, the earliest French composer to write an opera based on Goethe's Faust, an artist in the middle of the biggest political and aesthetic controversies of her time — in short, a composer who would warrant study even without reference to the question of her gender.

Neither Here nor There: Linda Lê and Kim Lefèvre's Literary Homecoming

Kate Averis	 74

This article analyzes Linda Lê and Kim Lefèvre's struggle to accommodate disparate racial, cultural and psychological aspects of their identity into an authentic sense of self and belonging through an examination of the representation of home and homecoming in their works. The journey of homecoming, and the representation of a site they come to recognize as home, are key to both authors' attempts to deal with the difficulties and adjustments of their displacement from their native Vietnam to their current place of residence in France. Tracing the link between the actual journey of homecoming and homecoming as a literary project, this article differentiates between Lefèvre's concern with the actual journey of departure from, and return to Vietnam, and the gradual literary and psychological homecoming that Lê achieves through the writing project. Focusing in particular on Lê's Calomnies and Lefèvre's Métisse blanche as the two novels which best explore the trope of journey, the role of language, the instability of the intercultural status, and the mingling of fact and fiction which are central to the authors' negotiation of home and homecoming, the article also examines the trope of home and homecoming in the wider context of each author's corpus. The article concludes with a discussion of the fundamental role of writing in both Lê and Lefèvre's quest for belonging, and the extent to which resolution of the identity quest is primarily achieved through the literary project.

A Memoir of Passage: Mort d'un silence by Clémence Boulouque

Since 2003, when Clémence Boulouque's memoir, *Mort d'un silence*, was published, its author has written in a variety of genres, including novels, articles, and film scripts. *Mort d'un silence*, her first work, interests us for several reasons: it revisits Judge Gilles Boulouque's suicide in December 1990 and the consequences of this act for his family, especially his thirteen-year-old daughter, Clémence; it recalls the political climate in France during the late 1980s, when Gilles Boulouque had already begun to fight terrorism; and it illustrates the tension between disclosure and concealment as its twenty-six-year-old narrator describes her passage from childhood to adolescence and from young to more mature adulthood.

Adrift with Marie Redonnet: Urban Spaces in Candy Story (1992)

Marie Redonnet describes Candy Story as a transitional novel written when the author felt she had reached an impasse in her creative work. This paper considers how the creative impasse to which Redonnet refers is elaborated in Candy Story through the main character's movements in and ambivalent identification with three urban spaces: the space of her present (Paris) and the two spaces of her childhood (Mills-le-Pont and Sise). The protagonist's trips through the landscape of her past intersect with the search for the subject of her second novel.

Marie Darrieussecq : écrivaine de l'entre-deux

Grâce à ces figures de style particulièrement bien adaptées au genre de la nouvelle, Annie Saumont réussit à donner – ou à redonner – aux mots du présent le poids de leurs significations passées. Les mots et les expressions utilisés par les personnages dans ces nouvelles sont doués de mémoire et c'est ce que l'écriture de la nouvelliste n'a de cesse de mettre en valeur.

Women's Resistance Roles and their Undoing in Three Works by Elsa Triolet

This essay examines Elsa Triolet's depiction of women's regressive socio-political trajectory from the conflicted and tenuous seizure of Resistance opportunities portrayed in "Les Amants d'Avignon" to the unraveling of Resistance ideals and identities in the climate of Cold War conservatism that supplanted the euphoria of the Liberation. "Les Amants d'Avignon, the first story in Triolet's Goncourt-Prize-winning Le Premier accroc coûte 200 francs, is read as a critique of limits to feminine agency in the Resistance that portends what became an unwelcome portrayal in her immediate post-war novels, Personne ne m'aime and Les Fantômes armés, of women's demoralizing return to social dependency after World War II. As contemporary historical studies pay increasing attention to the negative impact of the war on women in post-war France, Triolet's novels, widely dismissed at the time of their publication due to her communist politics, deserve reconsideration.

Pour tenter de résoudre cette énigme, nous nous pencherons dans une seconde partie sur Le mirador, les mémoires imaginaires d'Irène Némirovsky rédigés par sa fille cadette, Elisabeth Gille, et sur les deux biographies publiées par Jonathan Weiss et par Olivier Philipponnat et Patrick Lienhardt.

La quête de l'identité féminine est une reconstruction de l'image authentique de la femme à travers les générations. Chez Simone Schwarz-Bart, Gisèle Pineau et Myriam Warner-Vieyra, trois femmes écrivains de la Guadeloupe, deux tendances sont juxtaposées par le contraste de conditions féminines : si la femme traditionnelle est une bonne mère et épouse, symbole de l'endurance et de la résistance, la femme moderne est une révoltée qui transcende les canons socioculturels en quête de son émancipation personnelle. Cette thématique est abordée à travers trois générations de femmes : la grand-mère, la mère et la fille. Les femmes du roman *Terre salée* d'Irina Egli (Montréal, Boréal, 2006), sont mues par des désirs tout-puissants qui font à la fois leur bonheur et malheur. Quatre femmes archétypales (la fille incestueuse, la femme victime, la belle amante abandonnée, la belle-mère mythique, éternelle — le raisonneur de cette tragédie) rôdent autour d'un même homme, fatal et incongru, heureux de

vivre dans cet univers de femmes mais dégradé par ses propres mauvais choix. Toutes ces femmes agissent avec la conscience douloureuse d'être au beau milieu des choses et s'y rapportent de manière différente. Cet article propose d'interroger le roman d'Egli sous l'aspect mythologique, qui est une méthode privilégiée de remettre le monde et le temps en question tout en les ramenant au présent, mais aussi du point de vue d'un passage qui s'opère entre le profane et le sacré — reconfigurant la condition de voyageuse éternelle de la femme. Readings of recent works by Véronique Tadjo have emphasized the aesthetic implications of the author's use of fragmentation, but little attention has been paid to the ethical vision that shapes Tadjo's writing. This analysis of L'Ombre d'Imana and Reine Pokou: Concerto pour un sacrifice draws on the insights of contemporary feminist theory to argue that Tadjo's fragmentation of narratives of collective trauma reflects an ethically-driven challenge to the notion of a unitary Truth. Tadjo's metaphoric elaboration of images of shadow and light are part of an ethical strategy that contests the subjugation of myth to political ends and moves readers to reconsider the ethical dimensions of their personal and collective truths.




