Mr. W. A. Sredenschek:

There is no question that when a man builds a house his "interests" are divided and, for a time, the quantity of regular work he turns out is diminished. In fact, I sometimes wonder whether the company wouldn't be within its rights in placing a Monogram on each house its employees build.

As for us, our present status is that we await back filling and rough grading, plastering, the cement floor in the basement, then the usual operations of laying the linoleum, the finished flooring, putting in the necessary cabinet work, etc. As I look at it, there are a few times when I will have to be on hand. The first is during the back fill and rough grading. I will have to take the day off. It may come this week. I should be on hand when they run in the twenty yards of cement into the basement; then, for an occasional hour, to make sure that other operations such as the stone steps in the back of the kitchen, the plastering, etc. are done correctly.

Before very many weeks, however, I think we will have this on a predictable and plannable basis.

One complication has been that our contractor suffered a heart attack and has had to stay removed from the business leaving very little organization. His creditors have become very concerned, therefore, I must provide considerable of supervision which would otherwise not have been necessary.
