Periodical literature is the cutting edge of women's scholarship, feminist theory, and much of women's culture. Feminist Periodicals: A Current Listing of Contents is published by the Office of the University of Wisconsin System Women's Studies Librarian on a quarterly basis with the intent of increasing public awareness of feminist periodicals. It is our hope that Feminist Periodicals will serve several purposes: to keep the reader abreast of current topics in feminist literature; to increase readers' familiarity with a wide spectrum of feminist periodicals; and to provide the requisite bibliographic information should a reader wish to subscribe to a journal or to obtain a particular article at her library or through interlibrary loan. (Users will need to be aware of the limitations of copyright law with regard to photocopying of copyrighted materials.)

Table of contents pages from current issues of major feminist journals are reproduced in each issue of *Feminist Periodicals*, followed by a comprehensive annotated listing of all journals we have selected. As publication schedules vary enormously, not every periodical will have table of contents pages reproduced in each issue of *FP*. The annotated listing provides the following information on each journal:

- 1. Year of first publication.
- 2. Frequency of publication.
- 3. Subscription prices (print only; for online prices, consult publisher).
- 4. Subscription address.
- 5. Current editor.
- 6. Editorial address (if different from subscription address).
- 7. International Standard Serials Number (ISSN).
- 8. OCLC, Inc. Control Number.
- 9. Selected publications in which the journal is indexed.
- 10. Selected fulltext products in which publication appears or vendor intermediaries who make the full text available.
- 11. Subject focus/statement of purpose of the journal.

Please note that in the actual text, only the numbers 1 to 11 are used to identify the different categories of information.

Our goal in *Feminist Periodicals* is to represent English-language periodicals from around the world that focus on gender, women's studies, or women's issues. Generally, we do not include mainstream newsstand magazines. We are also unable to include periodicals that lack a complete table of contents. We encourage feminist serials to build a full table of contents into their regular format to facilitate possible inclusion in *FP* and indexing elsewhere.

University of Wisconsin System users: To locate these periodicals within the UW System, do a UW System/Universal Borrowing search from your campus catalog (labeled variously "Other Libraries," "More Libraries," "Other Catalogs," "Other UW Catalogs," etc.) If information on actual holdings (volumes and issues) is not in the records retrieved, contact the Reference Department at the library of interest.

Suggestions for improvements of *Feminist Periodicals* are gratefully received. We would particularly appreciate assistance from readers in the UW System with our efforts to keep the holding information complete and up to date. Please let us know about new subscriptions, subscriptions we have overlooked, cancellations, or other pertinent information.

Christine de Pizan adapted the literary conventions of male intellectual and spiritual friendship to her relationships with contemporary male authors—notably in the debate over *Le Roman de la rose*—but also to her virtual friendships with deceased and "otherworldly" female authors. Noteworthy examples are Dame Fortune in *Le Livre de la Mutacion de Fortune* and the "transgenerational spiritual sisterhood" evoked at length in the *Livre de la cité des dames*, a celebration of women's contributions to culture throughout the ages. A century after Christine's death, Catherine d'Amboise's *Complincte de la dame pasmee contre Fortune* combines the Boethian tradition that inspired Christine with a "friendly continuation" of the dialogue on the nature of friendship as a source of consolation. By transcending time and space, such an ideal sisterhood empowers women to resist the vicissitudes of Fortune.

Dangerous Exchanges: Gender and Money-Lending in Medieval Northern France

Jewish women played a central symbolic and practical role in helping their persecuted communities maintain coherence and identity, but their non-normative leadership roles are rarely recognized. This article examines their little-known but essential contributions to the burgeoning economic life of Northern French cities from the twelfth to the fourteenth century. Although they usually made only small loans, they often collaborated with male Jewish money-lenders in short-lived, varying partnerships in order to make substantial loans to nobles, for marriages or financial emergencies. In some localities, they controlled as much as one-third of the loan business. They had few female Christian counterparts. Not generally more emancipated than Christian women, they nevertheless found in money-lending opportunities to assert autonomy not otherwise granted them by society.

En nous intéressant à la figure de la mécène femme, non en tant que lectrice, réceptacle de l'œuvre, mais dans l'écriture autour d'images de création féminine, d'engendrement, d'inspiration morale, nous constatons qu'elle remplit une fonction d'auteur, d'autant plus prestigieux en ce qu'elle renvoie à des figures historiques royales: Philippa de Hainaut, chez Jean Froissant; la reine Isabeau, chez Christine de Pizan; Marguerite d'Autriche, chez Jean Molinet et Jean Lemaire de Belges. Cette dernière, ainsi que le mécène Anne de France, est une femme de pouvoir, solidaire de son sexe, éducatrice qui, lorsqu'elle autorise l'écriture vernaculaire, apporte une éthique et légitimité en rapport avec la démarche des poètes de son temps. Le mécène devient ainsi une alliée privilégiée des intellectuels à une période où ils recherchent pour eux-mêmes une manière autre que la misogynie et la phallocratie de penser l'autorité, la gloire et l'engagement littéraire.

Rivals or Friends? Anne de Bourbon and Anne de Bretagne

Tracy Adams46

Brantôme, a renowned biographer and gossip-monger, depicted Anne de Bourbon (1461-1522) and Anne of Brittany (1477-1514) as rivals. This interpretation, advanced seventy-five years after their deaths, has shaped interpretation to this day. I argue that accounts of their interactions must be understood in the context of the extensive networks of family relationships in which they functioned as intermediators. What have been taken as traces of innate personal qualities rendering the Annes incompatible must instead be recognized as traces of carefully enacted strategies of self-presentation aimed at specific political goals. Contemporary accounts, and two recorded interactions between the women, show no evidence of rivalry. Their continued contact, long after Charles VIII's death freed them from any mutual obligation, indicates that their relationship had grown affectionate. They continued to construct and cultivate their friendship in the absence of any political or social necessity.

Women Helping Women: Citizenship, Gender, and the Society for Maternal Charity (1788-1790, 1801-)

After the Revolution, women's efforts to assist families, in league with state agents, gave them a quasi-official status and afforded them a new sense of both social utility and political efficacy in collaboration with like-minded individuals. In the instance of the Society for Maternal Charity, after it passed under imperial control in 1810, elite connections, substantial resources, and a public voice for women on issues concerning motherhood, the protection of infants, and social policy gave it important influence in debates over family politics and child welfare in the nineteenth century. The rationale for the Society was the ideal of solidarity among women as they fulfilled the new obligations of humanitarian citizenship. Associational activity taught its members modes of organizational and political behavior. They became skilled politicians, with claims to public as well as familial utility.

The Convent as a Paradoxical Site of Women's Autonomy in Post-Revolutionary Autobiography and Fiction

Laurence M. Porter......76

In earlier times, "aut maritus aut murus" was a well-to-do young woman's proverbial fate. Because a nun's dowry cost far less than an upper-class marriage, the nunnery became a convenient repository for less-favored and illegitimate daughters. Despite the disruption of the Revolution, religious vocations increased throughout the nineteenth century, finally including one percent of all French people. Nuns eventually outnumbered the clergy. As nuns, they escaped "the economy of homosocial exchange," and could play all social roles within a democratically organized convent. Sand and Hugo each recognized the appeal of the convent as a potential site of female autonomy, particularly in the 1839 Lélia and in Les Misérables (1862). Lélia was a thought experiment with which Sand attempted to work through the problem of pride and her discouragement with visionary socialism. In contrast, Hugo adopts a voyeuristic stance toward convent life, but sympathizes with his nuns' defiant separatism from secular authority.

Mythology and Ideology: Literary Depictions of Natalie Clifford Barney in L'Ange et les pervers, Ladies' Almanack, and Amants féminins ou la troisième

Chelsea D. Ray......90

Convinced that women's writing was undervalued, Barney founded the Académie des femmes in 1927 as a feminist response to the conservative, all-male Académie Française. Inspired by Sappho's legendary school of poetry, she tried to create a cultural space conducive to women's artistic expression. In so doing, she brought the gendered stakes of cultural recognition to the forefront. Life as art came full circle when Barney's life was refracted back through half a dozen literary portraits by women authors, who sought to usurp the male prerogative of naming woman as eternal muse. Delarue-Mardrus and Djuna Barnes exemplify the blurring of literary, erotic, and socio-political domains that resulted. Our understanding of these works becomes more nuanced when they are read against one another: the writers in Barney's circle engaged in an ideological intertextual collaboration that produced a tangible literary record of the Académie des Femmes, together with some of the most radical critiques of gender in interwar Paris.

Flexing Their Underground Alliances: Women's Post-abolition Solidarity Building and Social Reform in Simone Schwarz-Bart's *Pluie et vent sur Télumée Miracle*

Zara Bennett......104

Post-abolition reforms were detrimental to black women. In the Caribbean, they were assigned a subordinate social status as dependents. Their loss of financial autonomy made them vulnerable to the abuse of male authority. Simone Schwarz-Bart's novel, *Pluie et vent sur Télumée Miracle*, examines how female friendships function as a coping strategy for disenfranchised blacks. The colonial regime engineered black men's compliance by consolidating domestic power in their hands. Télumée at first accepts to be subordinated to her lover Élie's authority. But when Élie fails her, Télumée's neighbors, and her mentors *man* Cia and later, Olympe, teach her to disregard social conventions. Through underground female alliances, Caribbean women challenge the dehumanizing logic of colonial ideology, and posit an ethic of solidarity that gives women expanded socio-economic roles.

Escaping Matriarchal Power: Rebellion and Transgression in Calixte Beyala's C'est le soleil qui m'a brûlée and Femme nue femme noire

Marzia Caporale......115

Beyala's narratives present a dystopic vision of motherhood and the maternal operating within the patriarchal order in Cameroon. The female protagonists in her novels are tragically split into two opposing groups: the supporters and the victims of a phallocentric model of female subjugation. The role of the mother, both biological and symbolic, is particularly problematic in this context. I explore two instances of defiance to matriarchal authority. Rebellion, however, is difficult to disseminate, because in Cameroonian culture women do not display solidarity with one another. The individual tactics of autoeroticism and turning aggression back against one's rapist secure relative freedom in the first novel; in the second, the taboo expression of female desire fails in the absence of female solidarity, and exile seems the only viable option—one that Beyala herself adopted in real life.

Literary Patronage: Collaboration or Rivalry? Women's Prefaces to Women's Texts in the 20th Century

Jeri English......126

One of the most renowned instances of prefatory recommendation in the twentieth century is Simone de Beauvoir's preface to La Bâtarde by Violette Leduc. Although Beauvoir's patronage undoubtedly contributed to Leduc's success, the preface is imbued with a palpable sense of rivalry between Beauvoir's authoritative discourse and the text she promotes. It looks to elaborate on Beauvoir's own autobiographical project. Her insistence that one must read Leduc's narrated life as an existential project reveals her desire to colonize Leduc's life story as an example of her own brand of autobiography. In contrast, Annie Leclerc's allographic afterword to Marie Cardinal's Autrement dit is a non-traditional, dialogical preface that avoids using Leclerc's paratextual authority. Instead, she privileges a feminist ideal of community and collaboration and highlights the text's own fluidity, open-endedness, and dialogism. Leclerc's dialogical afterword acknowledges that her quest for self-knowledge became possible only through her engagement with Marie Cardinal.





Abstract: The Cartwright Report was published by the New Zealand government in 1988. It presented the findings and recommendations of a judicial inquiry into allegations that women with cervical carcinoma in situ had been untreated or under-treated in the course of medical research at national Women's Hospital. The allegations arose in an article called 'An Un fortunate experiment at National Women's Hospital' authored by Phillida Bunkle and Sandra Coney. The recommendations included through reform of medical and research ethics. These popular reforms are usually regarded as feminist achievements and significant ethical millstones. A book by Professor Linda Bryder published internationally in 2009 and 2010 questions the reality of the 'experiment', the findings of the Cartwright inquiry and argues that the recommendations made little contribution to changes already underway within medicine. This article draws on the records of the inquiry, particularly the case histories of the women involved to refute Linda Bryder's arguments.

One for the girls?: Cervical cancer prevention and the introduction of the HPV vaccine in Aotearoa New Zealand **Christy Parker**, pp.25-39

Abstract: This article presents a critical feminist perspective on New Zealand's HPV immunisation programme. The programme, delivering the HPV vaccine to young women, has been progressively rolled out since September 2008 and heralded as a major development in cervical cancer prevention and women's health more generally. However, the programme has also been the subject of fierce debate, for both its context and the strategies used in its implementation. Women's health advocacy groups have been highly critical of aspects of the programme's implementation. Concerns have included the gendering of sexual health responsibility by targeting the vaccine only at young women; the disregard of consumer rights to informed choice and consent in the marketing of the programme; and the failure to integrate the programme which the National Cervical Screening Programme which risks undermining the life saving success of cervical screening in New Zealand. This article demonstrates the importance of careful and consultative programme planning and decision making to ensure population health policies deliver the best health outcomes to women. There are lessons to be learned from New Zealand's approach to introducing the HPV vaccine which demonstrate the continued importance of the contribution of critical gender erspectives in the development of health policy more generally.

Phenomenological sociology and the sociology of bioethics: two New Zealand studies **Rhonda Shaw and Sarah Donovan**, pp. 40-53

Abstract: This article addresses several issues raised by social scientists regarding the contribution of sociological research to bioethics, the activities of bioethicists themselves in the social construction of bioethical concerns, and the relationship between the public and bioethicists in establishing and maintaining public trust in medical and scientific research. The primary aim of the article is to demonstrate the value of social science research that investigates peoples' lived experience of modern biomedicine and innovative technology for bioethical debate. In order to do this, we offer snapshots of our research undertaken with New Zealanders from two separate studies respectively informed by phenomenology and the sociology of bioethics. The first study, which focuses on how people experience their self-identity and embodiment in organ donation and transplantation processes as fundamentally intersubjective and social, suggests why phenomenology should be incorporated into contemporary bioethical approaches deliberating issues about the body. The second study, which examines the value of lay perspectives in public engagement with bioethics, draws on research about women's decision-making regarding prenatal screening, to offer critical comment on bioethics as a social, cultural, and intellectual event

Cultural safety: Nurses' accounts of negotiating the order of things **Fran Richardson and Lesley MacGibbon**, pp. 54-65

Abstract: Cultural Safety is a significant nursing discourse in the nursing education curriculum in Aotearoa New Zealand. However, when nurses graduate and begin working in different practice settings it is only one of several competing discourses they negotiate in their daily practice. Cultural Safety, which is based on privileging the knowledge of the person who is being cared for, becomes a point of conflict within an environment where discourses of traditional nursing care and medicine compete. In this paper we examine how power relations are played out in practice settings by registered nurses who at times struggle to implement cultural safety knowledge in their work practices.
