The oldest of the State Colleges in Western Wisconsin, River Falls has had a long history of service to the state.

Eighty-four years have passed since its first class of six students was graduated. In the intervening years, marked by steady growth in enrollment, faculty, curricula and physical facilities, the College has held to an ideal — a belief in the essential worth of the individual.

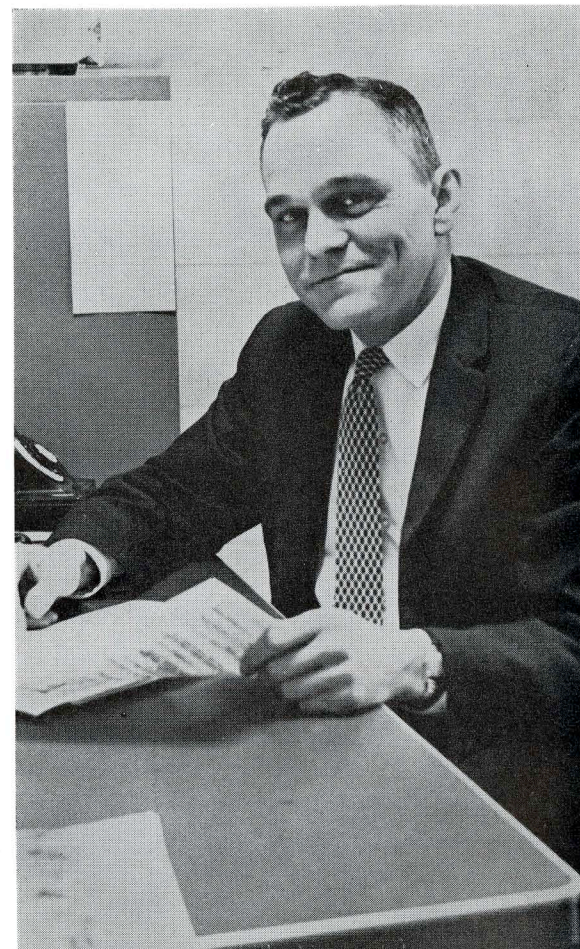
But we may also expect that the College will be loyal to the ideal it has served in the past and will remain a student-centered institution.
