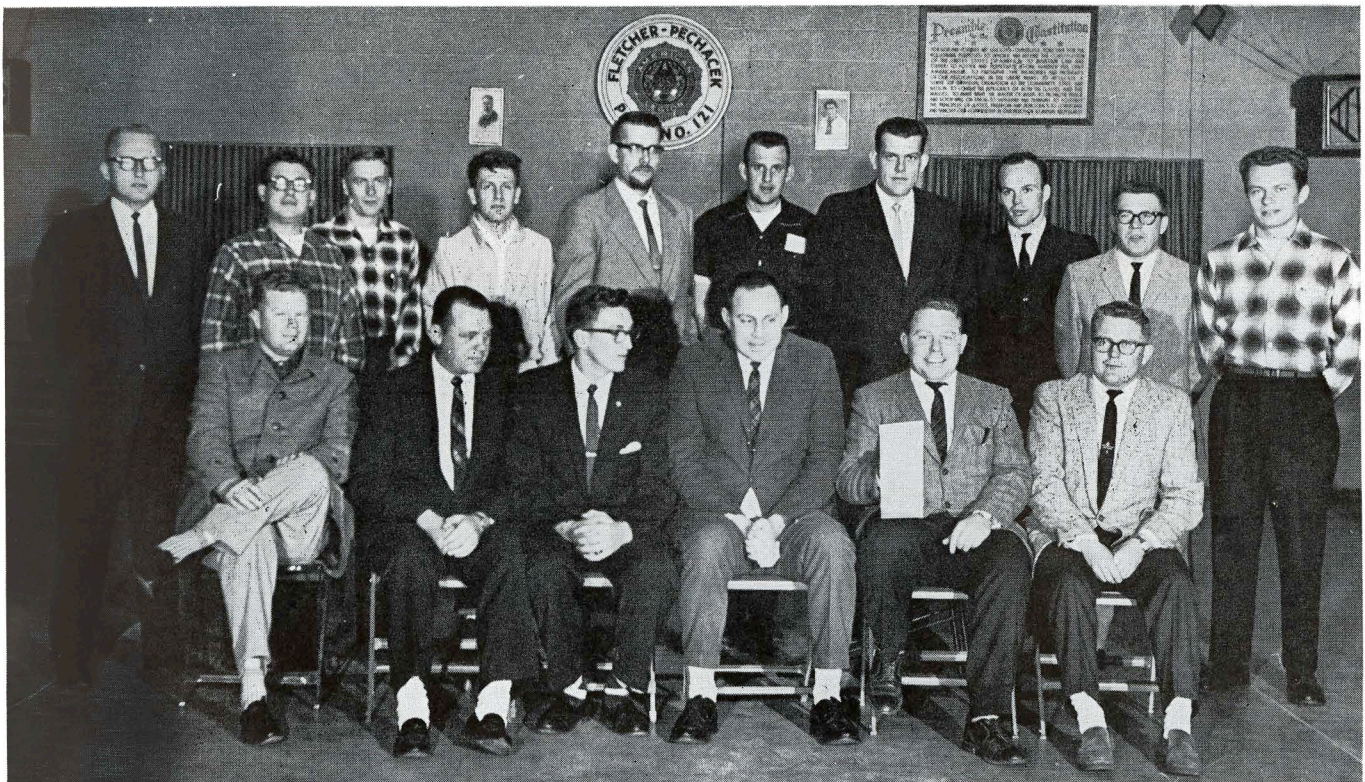
FALCON FILM SOCIETY

STUDENT FOUNDATION COMMITTEE

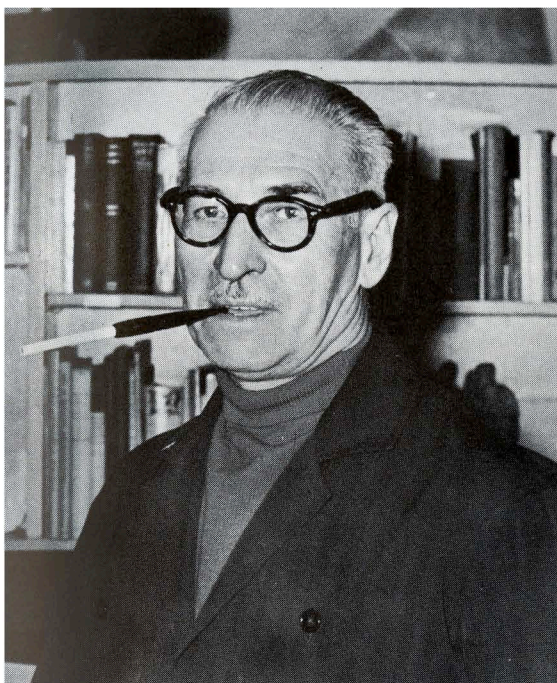

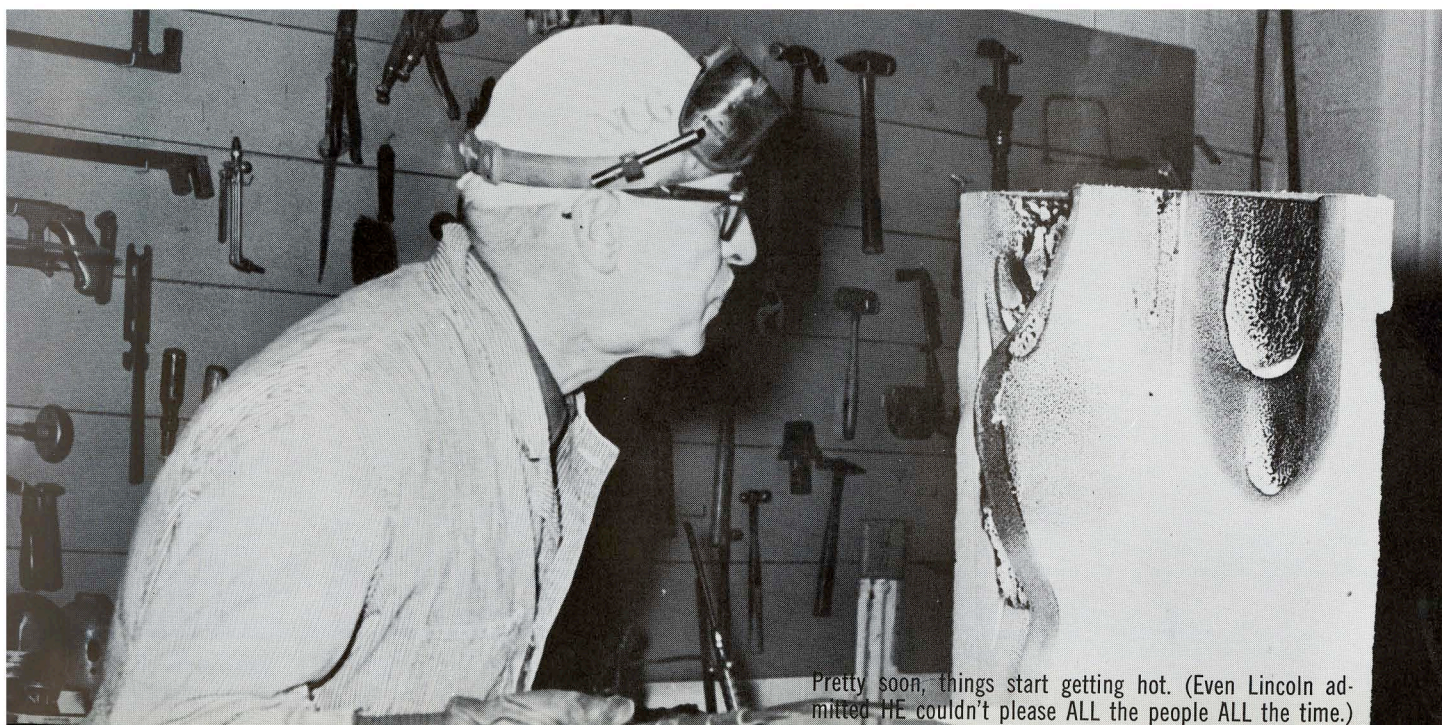

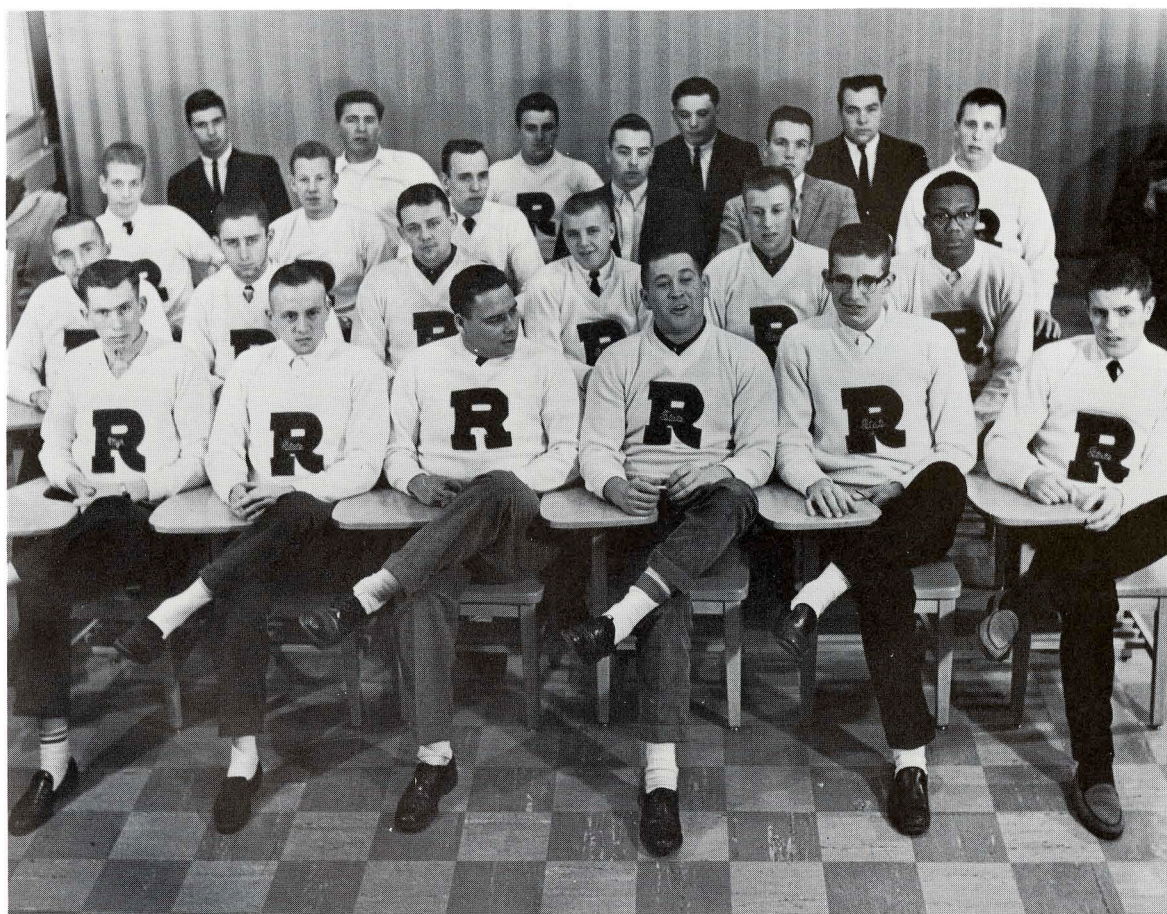
Sitzmarkers . . .

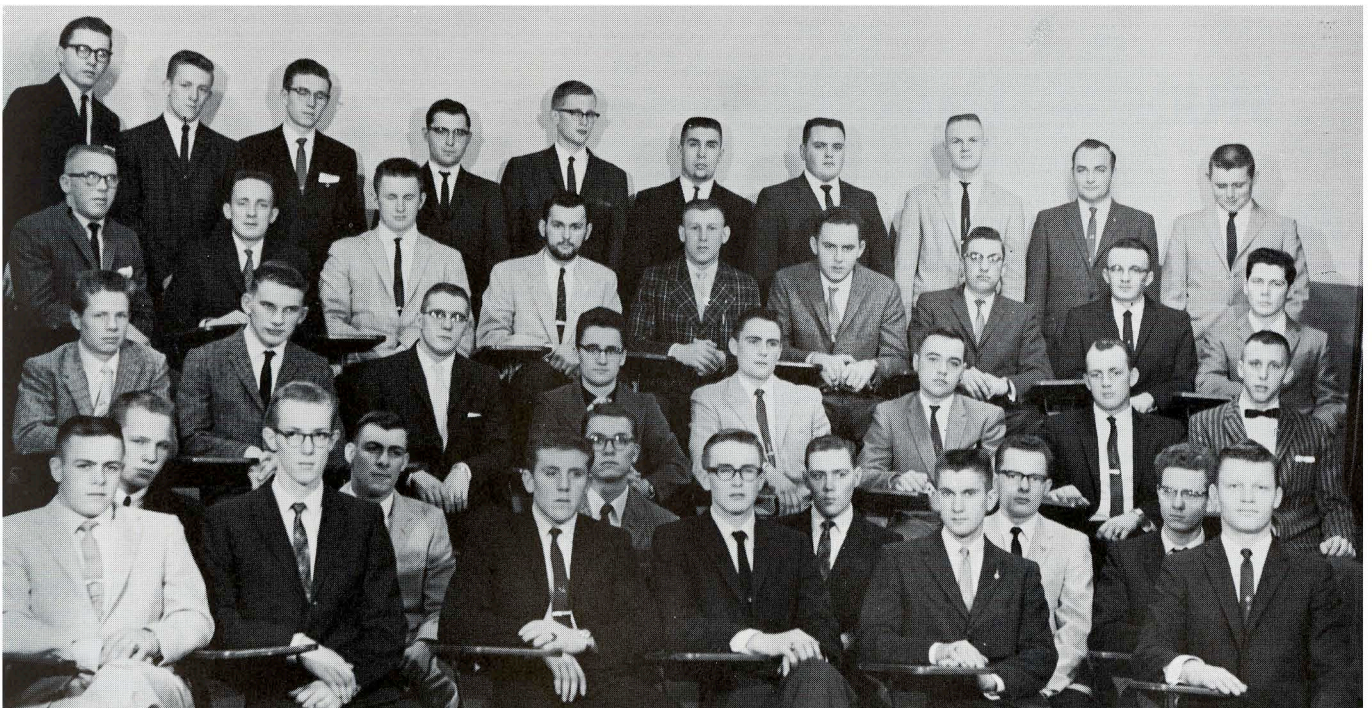

THE PINOCHLE CLUB

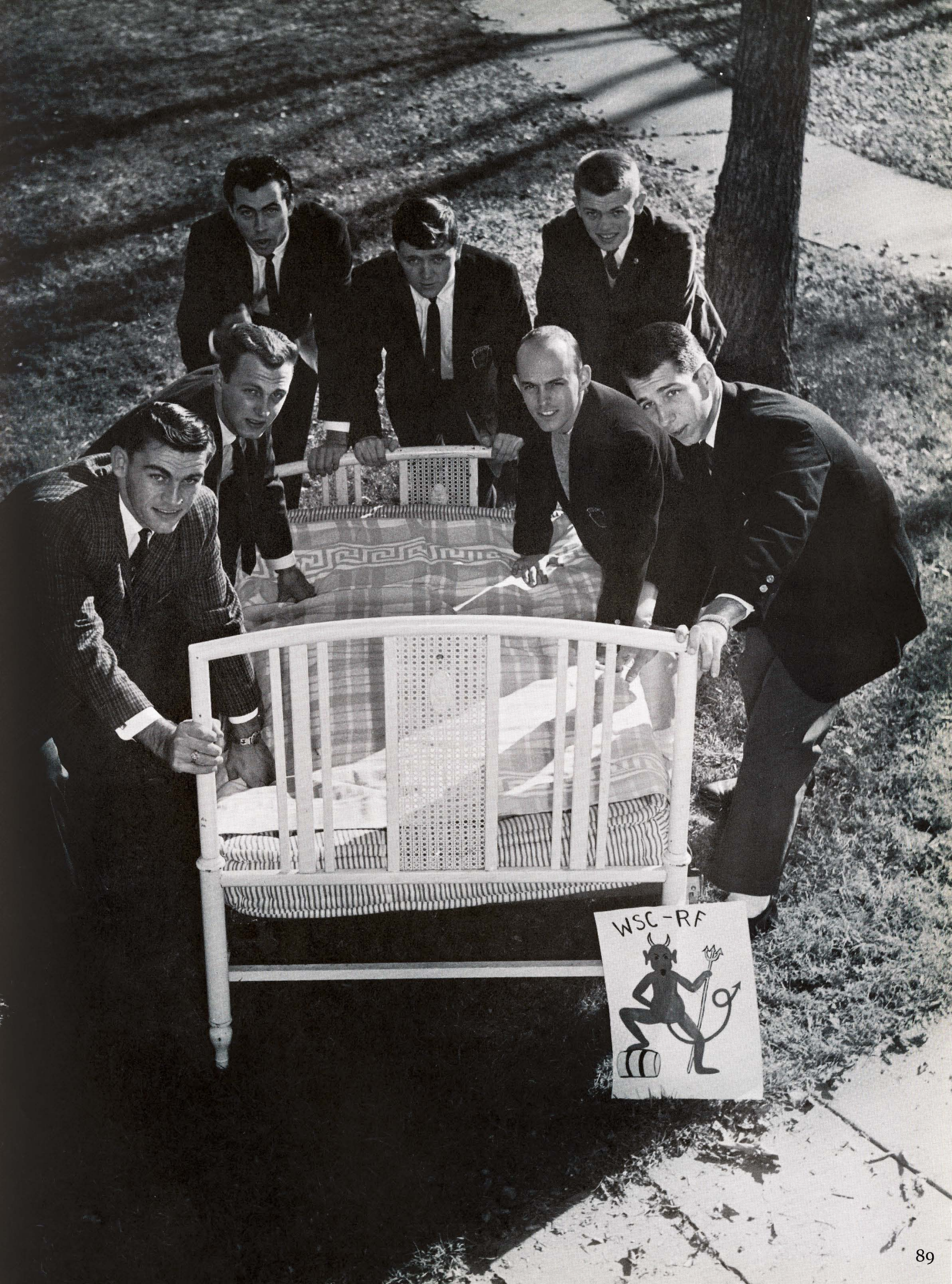

A NEW ENTHUSIASM

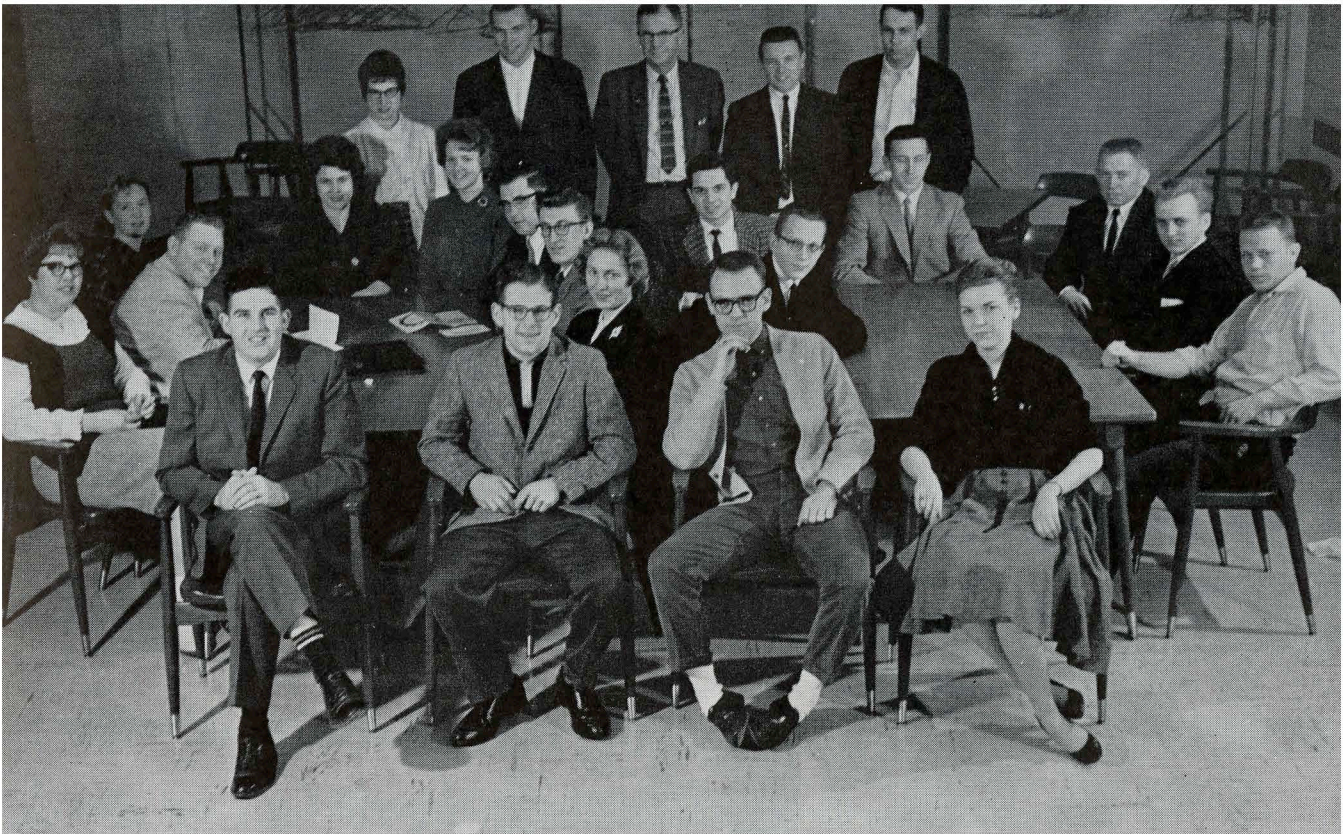

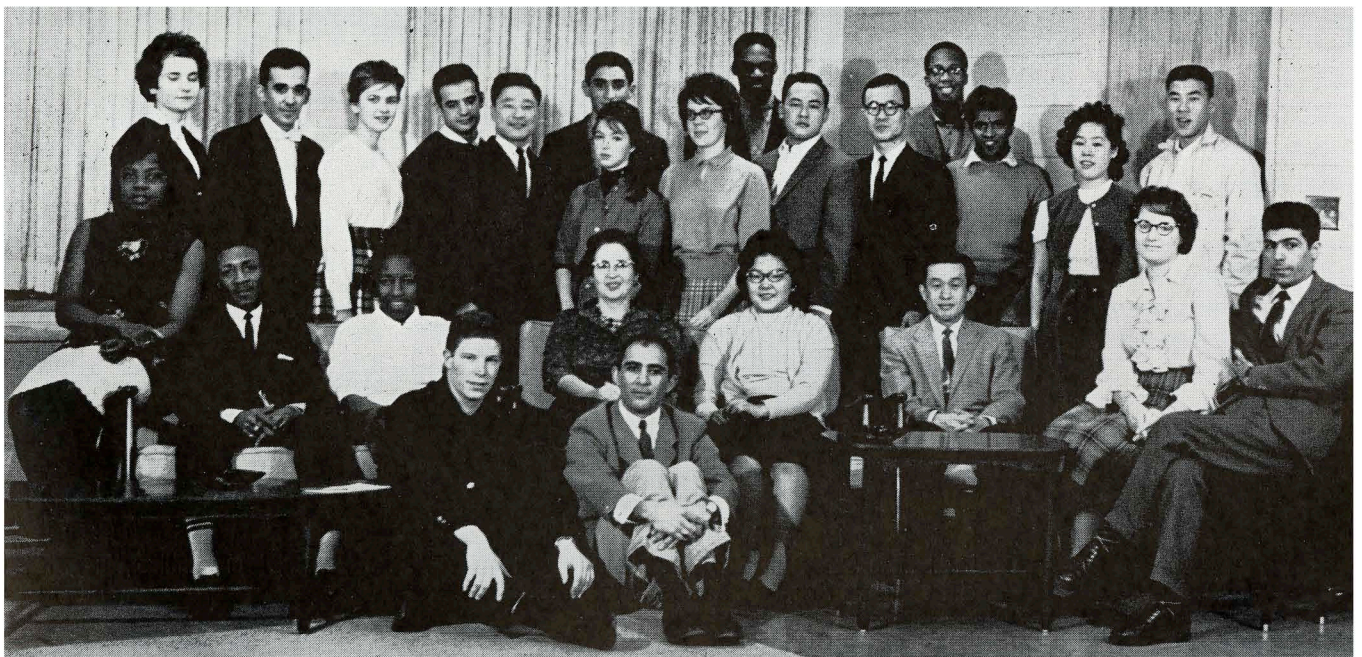
Much attention was given Mr. Welch who spoke at an all-school convocation held in Karges gymnasium. Mr. Welch spoke for some time.

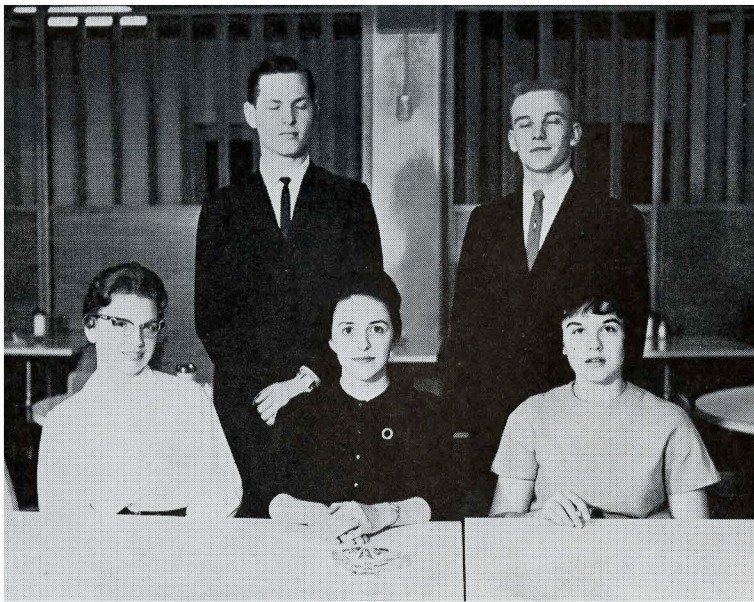

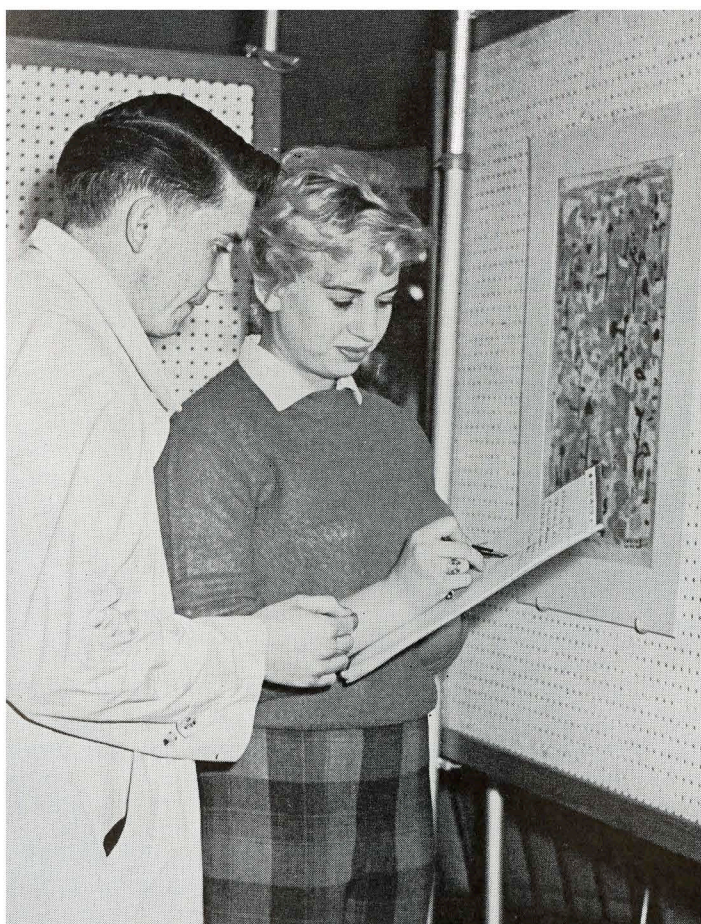

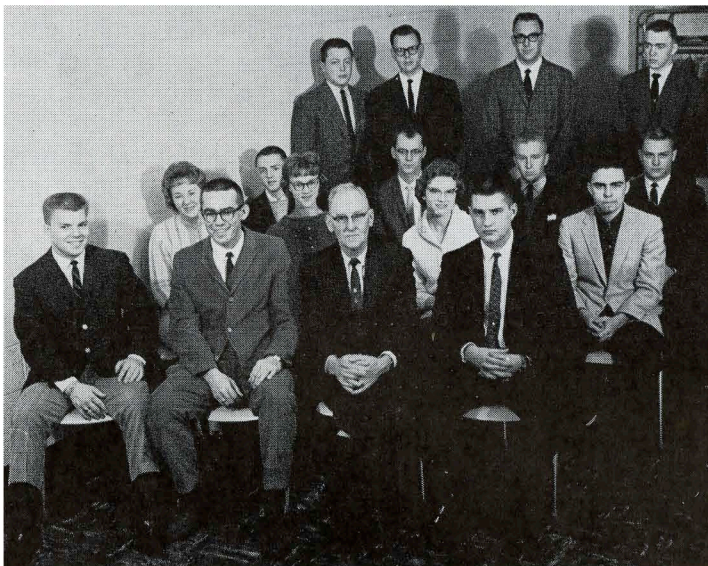
