### Biographical Note

Hans M. Hansen was born on May 30, 1883, in Trimbell, Wisconsin. When he was fourteen, he moved to Menomonie where he served an apprenticeship joining his employer, J.S. Govin, in 1904 to form the building and contracting firm of Govin and Hansen.

In 1912, Hansen joined the faculty at Stout teaching carpentry and cabinet making. He received his B.S. degree in Industrial Education from Stout in 1928 and his M.A. degree

in Administration and Supervision with a minor in Industrial Education from the University of Minnesota in 1936.

Hansen retired in 1952 after 40 years of teaching at Stout. In 1965 he was honored by the university by having the Hansen-Keith-Milnes-Chinnock Hall named after him. Hansen died on December 29, 1967.

### **Scope and Content Note**

The materials relate to instruction on woodworking courses at Stout and primarily consist of course syllabi developed by Hansen addressing such areas as wood properties, machine safety, woodworking, cabinet work and furniture making and millwrighting. Also included are occasional instruction sheets, lesson plans, job sheets, furniture project blueprints (most of which were drawn by Paul C. Nelson, another woodworking instructor), a course outline, and a machine operating policy.

Also included are two papers written by Hansen's students about machine woodworking. One paper addresses safety precautions in machine woodworking and makes extensive use of photographs (ca. 1938) taken at Ray Hall illustrating safety methods. Hansen's obituary is also included.
